

Pounder Meaning In Malayalam

The word chutney derives from Hindi चाढ़नी caṭnī, Urdu چٹنی chaṭnī, from चाढ़ना chāṭnā 'to lick, taste'. In South India, chutneys are known as pachadi (Telugu: పాచడి, Kannada: ಪಾಕಡಿ, Tamil: பாகடி, Malayalam: പാകടി, Marathi: पाकडी) meaning traditional South Indian sauces or chutneys served as side dishes. Roughly translated, a pachadi is a pounded or crushed plant.

Malabathrum is mentioned in the first century Greek text Periplus Maris Erythraei and sourced to a people called 'Sêsatai', identified with Kirradai (Kirata) of Ptolemy. Though malabathrum was a product of Northeast India, it was rarely traded by the western

traders at the mouth of the Ganges (which is much closer to the source) but at southwestern Indian ports of Muziris/Nelcynda. It is mentioned in the Periplus that some people collected the green leaves after the Sêsatai in the northeast prepared them and carried them to the ports of trade.
