Abutment: The tooth that supports and retains a dental prosthesis.

Pulp capping and symptoms Pre-operative tooth sensitivity Large pulpal exposure Uncontrollable bleeding from the pulp Non-restorable tooth Elderly patient In 1938, Bodecker Pulp capping is a technique used in dental restorations to protect the dental pulp, after it has been exposed, or nearly exposed during a cavity preparation, from a traumatic injury, or by a deep cavity that reaches the center of the tooth, causing the pulp to die. Exposure of the pulp causes pulpitis (an inflammation which can become irreversible, leading to pain and pulp necrosis, and necessitating either root canal treatment or extraction). The ultimate goal of pulp capping or stepwise caries removal is to protect a healthy (or reversibly inflamed) dental pulp, and avoid the need for root canal therapy

Fixed bridge: A dental prosthesis that is definitively attached to natural teeth and replaces missing teeth. Tranexamic acid was first... The main forms of cauterization used today are electrocautery and chemical cautery—both are, for example, prevalent in cosmetic removal of warts and stopping nosebleeds. Cautery can also mean the branding of a human. Organisms that never possessed teeth can also be described as edentulous. Examples are the members of the former zoological classification order of Edentata, which included anteaters and sloths, as they possess no anterior teeth and no or poorly developed posterior teeth. Connector: Joins the pontic to the retainer or two retainers together. Connectors may be fixed or movable. In naturally dentate species, edentulism is more than just the simple presence or absence of teeth. It is biochemically complex because the teeth, jaws, and oral mucosa are dynamic. Processes such as bone remodeling (loss and gain of bone tissue) in the jaws and inflammation of soft tissue in response to the oral microbiota are clinically important for edentulous people. For example, bone resorption in the jaw is frequently how the teeth were able to detach in the first place. The jaw in an edentulous area undergoes further resorption even after the teeth are gone; and the insertion of dental implants can elicit new bone formation, leading to osseointegration. Toothlessness In organisms that naturally have teeth, it is the result of tooth loss. 1967 study showed a significant bone loss during the first year after a tooth extraction which continues over the years, even without a denture or partial Toothlessness or edentulism is the condition of having no teeth

Dental trauma The study of dental trauma is called dental traumatology. alveolar fracture. The facial nerve and parotid Dental trauma refers to trauma (injury) to the teeth and/or periodontium (gums, periodontal ligament, alveolar bone), and nearby soft tissues such as the lips, tongue, etc. Gingivae bleeding especially around the margins may suggest injury to the periodontal ligament of the tooth

Side effects are rare; they include changes in color vision, seizures, blood clots, and allergic reactions. Tranexamic acid appears to be safe for use during pregnancy and breastfeeding. However, assessment for malocclusion should also take into account aesthetics and the impact on functionality. If these aspects are acceptable to the patient despite meeting the formal definition of malocclusion, then treatment may not be necessary. Resin-bonded bridge: A dental prostheses where the pontic is connected to the surface of natural teeth which are either unprepared or minimally prepared... 12977dd5e6

Dental extraction In orthodontics, if the teeth are crowded, healthy teeth may be extracted (often bicuspids) to create space so the rest of the teeth can be straightened. Extractions are performed for a wide variety of reasons, but most commonly to remove teeth which have become unrestorable through tooth decay, periodontal disease, or dental trauma, especially when they are associated with toothache. Sometimes impacted wisdom teeth (wisdom teeth that are stuck and unable to grow normally into the mouth) cause recurrent infections of the gum (pericoronitis), and may be removed when other conservative treatments have failed (cleaning, antibiotics and operculectomy). Extractions could be categorized into non-surgical (simple) and surgical, depending on the type of tooth to be removed and other factors. 12977dd5e6 Span: The length of the alveolar ridge between the natural teeth where the bridge will be placed. 12977dd5e6 == Types == 12977dd5e6 Saddle: The area on the alveolar ridge which is edentulous where at least one missing tooth is to be reinstated. 12977dd5e6 When dental caries is removed from a tooth, all or most of the infected and softened enamel and dentin are removed. This can lead to the pulp of the tooth either being exposed or nearly exposed. To prevent the pulp from deteriorating when a dental restoration gets near the pulp, the dentist will place a small amount of a sedative dressing, such as calcium hydroxide or mineral trioxide aggregate (MTA). These materials protect the pulp from noxious agents (heat, cold, bacteria) and stimulate the cell-rich zone of the pulp to lay down a bridge of reparative dentin. Dentin formation... 12977dd5e6 Cautery was historically believed to prevent infection, but current research shows that cautery actually increases the risk of infection by causing more tissue damage and providing a more hospitable environment for bacterial growth. Actual cautery refers to the metal device, generally heated to a dull red glow, that a physician applies to produce blisters, to stop bleeding of a blood vessel, and for other similar purposes. 12977dd5e6 Diagnosis is typically confirmed through blood tests. Managing VWD includes the use of desmopressin after minor trauma or before surgery, which allows the body to release more VWF. The disease is known to affect several breeds of dogs as well as humans. Four types of hereditary VWD have been described, including platelet-type VWD, with VWD type 1 being the most common. Types 1 and 2 are inherited through an autosomal dominant pattern, meaning at least one parent must also have the disease. 12977dd5e6

Symptoms of VWD include bleeding after dental extraction or other dental procedures. Most people with VWD have no symptoms. It is the most common hereditary coagulopathy in humans, affecting 1% of the population. The intake of Von Willebrand disease (VWD) is a type of blood-clotting disorder. An acquired form of VWD can sometimes result from other medical conditions 12977dd5e6

The aetiology of malocclusion is somewhat contentious... 12977dd5e6 The malocclusion classification is based on the relationship of the mesiobuccal cusp of the maxillary first molar and the buccal groove of the mandibular first molar. If this molar relationship exists, then the teeth can align into normal occlusion. According to Angle, malocclusion is any deviation of the occlusion from the ideal. 12977dd5e6 Pulpitis is reversible when the pain is mild to moderate and lasts for a short time after a stimulus (for instance cold); or irreversible when the pain is severe, spontaneous, and lasts a long time after a stimulus. Left untreated, pulpitis may become irreversible, then progress to pulp necrosis (death of the pulp) and apical periodontitis. Abscesses usually cause throbbing pain. The apical abscess usually occurs after pulp necrosis, the pericoronal abscess is usually associated... 12977dd5e6 Tranexamic acid is a synthetic analog of the amino acid lysine. It serves as an antifibrinolytic by reversibly binding four to five lysine receptor sites on plasminogen. This decreases the conversion of plasminogen to plasmin, preventing fibrin degradation and preserving the framework of fibrin's matrix structure. Tranexamic acid has roughly eight times the antifibrinolytic activity of an older analogue, ϵ -aminocaproic acid. Tranexamic acid also directly inhibits the activity of plasmin with weak potency ($IC_{50} = 87 \text{ mM}$), and it can block the active-site of urokinase plasminogen activator (uPA) with high specificity ($K_i = 2 \text{ mM}$), one of the highest among all the serine proteases. 12977dd5e6 Retainer: The component attached to the abutment for retention of the prosthesis. Retainers can be major or minor. 12977dd5e6 == Causes == 12977dd5e6 To prevent exsanguination 12977dd5e6 Unit: Pontics and abutment teeth are referred to as units. The total number of units in a bridge is equal to the number of pontics plus the number of abutment teeth. 12977dd5e6
