Globally, there have been at least 99 (civilian and military) recorded nuclear reactor accidents from 1952 to 2009 (defined as incidents that either resulted in the loss of

human life or more than US\$50,000 of property damage, the amount the US federal government uses to define major energy accidents that must be reported), totaling US\$20.5 billion in property damages. The accidents involved meltdowns, explosions, fires, and loss of coolant, and occurred during both normal operation and... 6048d3a7a3 The plant was the site of the most significant accident in United States commercial nuclear energy when, on March 28, 1979, TMI-2 suffered a partial meltdown. According to the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) report, the accident resulted in no deaths or injuries to plant workers or in nearby communities. Follow-up epidemiology studies did not find causality between the accident and any increase in cancer cases. 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Nuclear and radiation accidents and incidents Nuclear power accidents can involve A nuclear and radiation accident is defined by the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) as "an event that has led to significant consequences to people, the environment or the facility. " Examples include lethal effects to individuals, large radioactivity release to the environment, or a reactor core melt. In 1981, workers inadvertently reversed pipe restraints at the Diablo Canyon Power Plant reactors, compromising

seismic protection systems, which further undermined confidence in nuclear safety. All of these well-publicised events, undermined public support for the U.S. nuclear industry in the 1970s and the 1980s. In 2002, the USA had what former NRC Commissioner Victor Gilinsky termed "its closest brush with disaster" since Three Mile Island's 1979 meltdown; a workman at the Davis-Besse reactor found a large rust hole in the top of the reactor pressure vessel. 6048d3a7a3

It has two separate units, Unit 1 (TMI-1) (owned by Constellation Energy) and Unit 2 (TMI-2) (owned by EnergySolutions)
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The reactor core of TMI-2 has since been removed from the site, but as of 2009 the site has not been fully decommissioned. In July 1998, Amergen Energy (now Exelon Generation) agreed to purchase TMI-1 from General Public Utilities for \$100 million. 6048d3a7a3

The most serious of these was the Three Mile Island accident in 1979. The reactor components ruptured and lost coolant, and the resulting steam explosions and meltdown destroyed the reactor building. 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Plant, located near Pripjat, Ukraine, exploded. The operators carried out the test following an accidental drop in reactor power. The disaster occurred during a test to simulate the cooling of the reactor during a serious accident in blackout conditions. With dozens of direct casualties and thousands of health complications stemming from the disaster, it is one of only two nuclear accidents rated at the maximum severity on the International Nuclear Event Scale, the other being the 2011 Fukushima nuclear accident, which happened in Japan. It remains the most destructive nuclear disaster and the most expensive disaster in history, with an estimated cost of US\$700 billion 6048d3a7a3

The plant comprises seven separate boiling water reactors originally designed by General Electric (GE), and maintained by the Tokyo Electric Power Company (TEPCO). At the time of the quake, Reactor 4 had been de-fueled while 5 and 6 were in cold shutdown for planned

maintenance. Immediately after the earthquake, the remaining reactors 1–3 shut down automatically, and emergency generators came online to control electronics and coolant systems. However the tsunami following the earthquake quickly flooded the low-lying rooms in which the emergency generators were housed. The flooded generators failed, cutting power to the critical pumps that must continuously circulate coolant water through a Generation II nuclear reactor for several days in order to keep it from melting down after being shut down. Technical measures to reduce the risk of accidents or to minimize the amount of radioactivity released to the environment have been adopted; however, human error remains, and there have been many accidents with varying impacts as well as near misses and incidents. As of 2014, there have been more than 100 serious nuclear accidents and incidents from the use of nuclear power.
