== Structure of gels == 625d575dc5 Sulfacetamide is a sulfonamide antibiotic, that is used as a cream to treat skin infections and as eye drops to treat eye infections. On the skin it is used to treat acne and seborrheic dermatitis. In cream form it is used to treat bacterial infections on the skin. It can also be used orally to treat urinary tract infections. It kills the bacteria by restricting the production of folic acid, which is essential for bacterial growth. It mainly inhibits the multiplication of bacteria as it acts in a competitive inhibitor. 625d575dc5 Common side effects when applied to the skin include redness. Common side effects when taken by mouth include nausea, headache, and liver problems. Liver problems may result in death or the need for a liver transplantation. Other severe side effects when taken orally include QT prolongation, adrenocortical insufficiency, and anaphylaxis. It functions by inhibiting the synthesis of folic acid in bacteria, which is essential for their growth and reproduction, thereby exerting a bacteriostatic effect.

Azelaic acid is industrially produced by the ozonolysis of oleic acid. The side product is nonanoic acid. It is produced naturally by *Malassezia furfur* (also known as *Pityrosporum ovale*), a yeast that lives on normal skin. The bacterial degradation of nonanoic acid gives azelaic acid.

Ketoconazole Other uses include treatment of excessive male-patterned hair growth in women and Cushing's syndrome. Applied to the skin it is used for fungal skin infections such as tinea, cutaneous candidiasis, pityriasis versicolor, dandruff, and seborrheic dermatitis. Taken by mouth it is a less preferred option and recommended for only severe infections when other agents cannot be used. in some cases. However, one study found that applying a 2% Topical Ketoconazole solution on the balding scalps of women found comparable regrowth to Ketoconazole, sold under the brand name Nizoral, among others, is an antiandrogen, antifungal, and antiglucocorticoid medication used to treat a number of fungal infections.

Clindamycin In combination with quinine, it can be used to treat malaria. It can also be used to treat acne, and some cases of methicillin-resistant *Staphylococcus aureus* (MRSA).
