Median neuropathy at the carpal tunnel (the symptoms of which are carpal tunnel syndrome) is typically characterized by numbness. Idiopathic ulnar neuropathy at the elbow is a condition where pressure on the ulnar nerve as it passes through the cubital tunnel causes ulnar neuropathy. The symptoms of neuropathy are paresthesia (tingling) and numbness (loss of sensation) primarily affecting the little finger and ring finger of the hand. Ulnar neuropathy can progress to weakness and atrophy of the muscles in the hand (interossei and small and ring finger lumbrical) d7d1dda06b

Carpal tunnel syndrome Carpal tunnel syndrome can also occur with rheumatoid arthritis, due to the enlarged synovial lining of the tendons causing median nerve compression. Other causes of median nerve compression at the carpal tunnel include bleeding, swelling, and deformity associated with a wrist fracture. Compressive Carpal tunnel syndrome (CTS) is the symptoms and signs characteristic of compressive median neuropathy at the carpal tunnel of the wrist. Most cases of median neuropathy at the carpal tunnel are idiopathic, meaning there is no known cause. Compressive median neuropathy is a structural, largely hereditary condition that is usually measurable in both wrists. Cubital tunnel syndrome 9%, there is a notable Cubital tunnel syndrome (CuTS) is an entrapment neuropathy, or nerve compression syndrome, a condition caused by compression, traction, or friction of the ulnar nerve at the elbow. Nerve compression is also known as a trapped nerve. While the symptomatic prevalence is roughly estimated to be around 5. The ulnar nerve travels from the brachial plexus down the length of the arm to the hand. At the elbow, the ulnar nerve passes through the cubital tunnel, where ulnar nerve compression most commonly occurs. of the upper extremity, following carpal tunnel syndrome. The ulnar nerve provides motor and sensory innervation to the forearm and hand, and its compression can cause numbness and other symptoms associated with cubital tunnel syndrome, commonly in the fourth and fifth fingers. Cubital tunnel syndrome is an ulnar neuropathy that can be caused not only by compression at the cubital tunnel level itself, but can also be caused by movement of the elbow. The volume of the cubital tunnel may be reduced when being moved from full extension to a lesser degree of flexion. In many cases, the cause of CuTS is unknown. d7d1dda06b

Tarsal tunnel syndrome One nerve (calcaneal) continues to the heel, the other two (medial and lateral plantar nerves) continue on to the bottom of the foot. The tarsal tunnel is delineated by bone on the inside and the flexor retinaculum on the outside. Inside the tunnel, the nerve splits into three segments. The tarsal tunnel is found along the inner leg behind the medial malleolus (bump on the inside of the ankle). The posterior tibial artery, tibial nerve, and tendons of the tibialis posterior, flexor digitorum longus, and flexor hallucis longus muscles travel in a bundle through the tarsal tunnel. contrast to carpal tunnel syndrome due to one tunnel at the wrist for the median nerve, there are four tunnels in the medial ankle for tarsal tunnels syndrome Tarsal tunnel syndrome (TTS) is a nerve compression syndrome or nerve entrapment syndrome causing a painful foot condition in which the tibial nerve is entrapped as it travels through the tarsal tunnel d7d1dda06b

== Normal conduction velocities == d7d1dda06b Ultimately, conduction velocities are specific to each individual and depend largely on an axon's diameter and the degree to which that axon is myelinated, but the majority of 'normal' individuals fall within defined ranges. d7d1dda06b People with TTS typically complain of numbness in the foot radiating to the big toe and the first three toes, pain, burning, electrical sensations, and tingling over the base of the foot and the heel. Depending on the area of entrapment, other areas can be affected. If the entrapment is high, the entire foot can be affected as varying branches of the tibial nerve can become involved. Ankle pain is also present... d7d1dda06b Some examples of symptoms experienced by patients with RSI are aching, pulsing pain, tingling and extremity weakness, initially presenting with intermittent discomfort and then with a higher degree of frequency. d7d1dda06b Diagnosis can be made with clinical symptoms, physical examination, imaging, and electrodiagnostic tests. There... d7d1dda06b Surgical planning is distinct from diagnosis of entrapment. Diagnosis will focus on a binary decision: does the patient have entrapment or not? A diagnosis may not be enough information for surgery on its own as the area to explore may be too large. Surgical planning seeks to localize the specific area of entrapment to improve surgical outcomes. Identifying the... d7d1dda06b In general, ulnar neuropathy will result in symptoms in a specific anatomic distribution, affecting the little finger, the ulnar half of the ring finger, and the intrinsic muscles of the hand. d7d1dda06b As a consequence of these various definitions, fractures to the carpal bones are referred to as carpal fractures, while fractures such as distal radius fracture are often considered fractures to the wrist. d7d1dda06b Physical therapists and occupational therapists are involved in the assessment and intervention process with clients with carpal tunnel syndrome (CTS). The main symptoms are numbness and tingling of the thumb, index finger, middle finger, and the thumb side of the ring finger, as well as pain in the hand and fingers. Symptoms are typically most troublesome at night. Many people sleep with their wrists bent, and the ensuing symptoms may lead to awakening. People wake less often at night if they wear a wrist splint. Untreated, and over years to decades, CTS causes loss of sensitivity, weakness, and shrinkage (atrophy) of the thenar muscles at the base of the thumb. == Signs and symptoms ==

Repetitive strain injury Other common names include repetitive stress injury, repetitive stress disorders, cumulative trauma disorders, and overuse syndrome. sometimes be attributed to such causes include tendinosis (or less often tendinitis), carpal tunnel syndrome, cubital tunnel syndrome, De Quervain syndrome A repetitive strain injury (RSI) is an injury to part of the musculoskeletal or nervous system caused by repetitive use, vibrations, compression or long periods in a fixed position

Nerve decompression compared carpal tunnel syndrome patients who elected surgery with those who chose not to. 77% of the surgery group said they were cured compared to 16% who A nerve decompression is a neurosurgical procedure to relieve chronic, direct pressure on a nerve to treat nerve entrapment, a pain syndrome characterized by severe chronic pain and muscle weakness. In this way a nerve decompression targets the underlying pathophysiology of the syndrome and is considered a first-line surgical treatment option for peripheral nerve pain. Traditionally only nerves accessible with open surgery have been good candidates, however

innovations in laparoscopy and nerve-sparing techniques made nearly all nerves in the body good candidates, as surgical access is no longer a barrier. Despite treating the underlying cause of the disease, the symptoms may not be fully reversible as delays in diagnosis can allow permanent damage to occur to the nerve and surrounding microvasculature

Work-related factors such as vibration... Nerve impulses are extremely slow compared to the speed of electricity, where the electric field can propagate with a speed on the order of 50–99% of the speed of light; however, it is very fast compared to the speed of blood flow, with some myelinated neurons conducting at speeds up to 120 m/s (432 km/h or 275 mph). The speed of nerve impulse transmission ranges from about 0.5 m/s to over 120 m/s.

Tinel's sign and Phalen's tests can be used to assess for CTS. They may be administered by the physical therapist (PT) or occupational therapist (OT). Tinel's sign involves tapping at the volar wrist while Phalen's test involves maintaining maximum wrist flexion for 60 seconds. In both tests, a positive sign is indicated by numbness, tingling or pain in the thumb, index and half of the middle finger. The presence of positive Tinel's sign, Phalen sign, Flick... == Assessment == Surgical planning == The specific symptoms experienced in the characteristic distribution depend on the specific location of ulnar nerve compression. The hallmark symptom of ulnar neuropathy at the elbow (cubital tunnel

syndrome) is paresthesia (tingling). This can progress to a loss of sensibility. Muscle weakness is usually experienced as a loss of dexterity. d7d1dda06b

Nerve compression syndrome Nerve injury by a single episode of physical trauma is in one sense an acute compression neuropathy but is not usually included under this heading, as chronic compression takes a unique pathophysiological course. A surgical nerve decompression can relieve pressure on the nerve but cannot always reverse the physiological changes that occurred before treatment. This may be due to weight gain or peripheral oedema Nerve compression syndrome, or compression neuropathy, or nerve entrapment syndrome, is a medical condition caused by chronic, direct pressure on a peripheral nerve. Occasionally imaging and electrophysiology studies aid in the diagnosis. The symptoms affect just one particular part of the body, depending on which nerve is affected. Its symptoms include pain, tingling, numbness and muscle weakness. Timely diagnosis is important as untreated chronic nerve compression may cause permanent damage. The diagnosis is largely clinical and can be confirmed with diagnostic nerve blocks. It is known colloquially as a trapped nerve, though this may also refer to nerve root compression (by a herniated disc, for example). space where there is little room for this to occur, as is often the case in carpal tunnel syndrome d7d1dda06b

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
