Paget's disease of bone The affected bones show signs of dysregulated bone remodeling at the microscopic level, specifically excessive bone breakdown and subsequent disorganized new bone formation. Approximately 35% of patients with Paget's have symptoms related to the disease when they are first diagnosed. These structural changes cause the bone to weaken, which may result in deformity, pain, fracture or arthritis of associated joints. Overall, the most common symptom is bone pain Paget's disease of bone (commonly known as Paget's disease or, historically, osteitis deformans) is a condition involving cellular remodeling and deformity of one or more bones 55eae4931e

The exact cause is unknown, although leading theories indicate both genetic and acquired factors (see Causes). Paget's disease may affect any one or several bones of the body (most commonly pelvis, tibia, femur, lumbar vertebrae, and skull), but never the entire skeleton, and does not spread from bone to bone. Canine hip dysplasia Secondly, the caput or acetabulum are not In dogs, hip dysplasia is an abnormal formation of the hip socket that, in its more severe form, can eventually cause lameness and arthritis of the joints. not deeply and tightly held by the acetabulum. It is common in many dog breeds, particularly the larger breeds, and is the most common single cause of arthritis of the hips. It is a genetic (polygenic) trait that is affected by environmental factors. Instead of being a snug fit, it is a loose fit, or a partial fit 55eae4931e

Intraarticular fracture For the majority of these fractures, anatomic reduction is vital to maintain the integrity of the joint surface. Compared to extraarticular fractures, intraarticular have a higher risk for developing long-term complications, such as posttraumatic osteoarthritis. bone. This always results in damage to the cartilage, an area of limited healing capability. If there is a disruption of vasculature in the fragment, secondary ossification will occur and the fragment will become a loose body in the joint An intraarticular fracture is a bone fracture that typically runs parallel to the joint surface in which the break crosses into the surface of a joint, through the articular cartilage 55eae4931e

Osteochondritis dissecans In later stages of the disorder there will be swelling of the affected joint that catches and locks during movement. Physical examination in the early stages does only show pain as symptom, in later stages there could be an effusion, tenderness, and a crackling sound with joint movement. "osteochondritis dissecans", describing it as a subchondral inflammatory process of the knee, resulting in a loose fragment of cartilage from the femoral condyle Osteochondritis dissecans (OCD or OD) is a joint disorder primarily of the subchondral bone in which cracks form in the articular cartilage and the underlying subchondral bone. OCD usually causes pain during and after sports

In this condition, cartilaginous metaplasia takes place within the synovial membrane of the joint. Metaplastic synovium organizes into nodules. With minor trauma, nodules are shed as small bodies into the joint space. In some patients, the disease process may involve tendon sheaths and bursal sacs.

Osteochondrosis The ultimate cause for these Osteochondrosis is a family of orthopedic diseases of the joint that occur in children, adolescents and rapidly growing animals, particularly pigs, horses, dogs, and broiler chickens. This disorder is defined as a focal disturbance of endochondral ossification and is regarded as having a multifactorial cause, so no one thing accounts for all aspects of this disease. becomes more strained. They are characterized by interruption of the blood supply of a bone, in particular to the epiphysis, followed by localized bony necrosis, and later, regrowth of the bone. Sometimes the symptoms can be mild or there may be no symptoms, which can make it hard to detect a problem

- Adhesive capsulitis of shoulder In dogs osteochondrosis is seen in elbow, shoulder, knee, and ankle joints. Elbow osteochondrosis is also known as elbow dysplasia. There are three types of elbow dysplasia: fragmented medial coronoid process, ununited anconeal process and osteochondritis... Osteochondrosis is a developmental disease. It usually occurs in an early stage of life. It has personified features as focal chondronecrosis and confinement of growth cartilage due to a failing of endochondral ossification. Fissures can develop from lesions over the top articular cartilage and form a cartilage flap and an osteochondral fragment. It is diagnosed as osteochondritis dissecans.

Meniscus tear The traumatic action is most often a twisting movement at the knee while the leg is bent. In older adults, the meniscus can be damaged following prolonged 'wear and tear'. Menisci can be torn during innocuous activities such as walking or squatting. Especially acute injuries (typically in younger, more active patients) can lead to displaced tears which can cause mechanical symptoms such as clicking, catching, or locking during motion of the joint. The common signs and symptoms of a torn meniscus are knee pain, particularly A tear of a meniscus is a rupturing of one or more of the fibrocartilage strips in the knee called menisci. When doctors and patients refer to "torn cartilage" in the knee, they actually may be referring to an injury to a meniscus at the top of one of the tibiae. together with a tear of the anterior cruciate ligament and medial collateral ligament. They can also be torn by traumatic force encountered in sports or other forms of physical exertion

- Albright's hereditary osteodystrophy The advantage over traditional open surgery is that the joint does not have to be opened up fully. For knee arthroscopy only two small incisions are made, one for the arthroscope and one for the surgical instruments to be used in the knee cavity. This reduces recovery time and may increase the rate of success due to less trauma to the connective tissue. It has gained popularity due to evidence of faster recovery times with less scarring, because of the smaller incisions. Irrigation fluid (most commonly 'normal' saline) is used to distend the joint and make a surgical space. - Arthralgia... - Apprehension test

Synovial osteochondromatosis In most occurrences, there is only one joint affected, either the knee, the hip, or the elbow. Rarely involves the TMJ. The cause is unknown. In Synovial osteochondromatosis (SOC) (synonyms include synovial chondromatosis, primary synovial chondromatosis, synovial chondrometaplasia) is a rare disease that creates a benign change or proliferation in the synovium or joint-lining tissue, which changes to form bone-forming cartilage. In most occurrences, there is only one joint affected, either the knee, the hip, or the elbow. Rarely involves the TMJ. cartilage

Articular cartilage is composed of 60-80% water and components of collagens. Its functions are to maintain structure with a lifetime of stress and repetition of movement. Biological repair and cellular turnover is therefore limited leading to the restricted response to traumatic injury. Destruction of the cartilage leads to an activation of an inflammatory cascade leading to regeneration or destruction of the cartilage, the basis of posttraumatic osteoarthritis. OCD is caused by blood deprivation of the secondary physes around the bone core of the femoral condyle. This happens to the epiphyseal vessels under the influence of repetitive overloading of the joint during running and jumping sports. During growth such chondronecrotic areas grow into the subchondral bone. There it will show as bone defect area under articular cartilage. The bone will then possibly heal to the surrounding condylar bone in 50% of the cases. Or it will develop into a pseudarthrosis between condylar bone core and osteochondritis flake leaving the articular cartilage it supports prone to damage. The damage is executed by ongoing sport overload. The result is fragmentation... - American Joint Replacement Registry == Pathophysiology == A - Apley scratch test - Ankle replacement The cause is unknown. - Adamantinoma - Akin osteotomy A tear of the medial meniscus can occur as part of the unhappy triad, together with a tear of the anterior cruciate ligament and medial collateral ligament. - Apert syndrome - Aneurysmal bone cyst These fracture patterns are likely a result of shearing, rotatory, or tangential forces applied to the joint producing segments of both bone and cartilage. The fracture generally... - ALPSA lesion Cartilaginous intra-articular bodies float freely within the synovial fluid, which they require for nutrition and growth. Progressive enlargement and ossification occur with time. If they remain free, they continue to grow larger and more calcified. In severe cases, they may occupy the entire joint space or penetrate to adjacent tissues. Also, they can deposit in the synovial lining, reestablish a blood supply, and become replaced by bone. It is more common in athletes, particularly those who participate in alpine skiing, football (soccer), netball, American football, or basketball. Diagnosis is typically made by physical examination and is sometimes supported and confirmed by magnetic resonance imaging (MRI).
