The word epidermis is derived through Latin from Ancient Greek epidermis, itself from Ancient Greek epi 'over, upon' and from Ancient Greek derma 'skin'. Something related to or part of the epidermis is termed epidermal.

Stratified squamous epithelium Only one layer is in contact with the basement membrane; the other layers adhere to one another to maintain structural integrity. This type of epithelium is well suited to areas in the body subject to constant abrasion, as the thickest layers can be sequentially sloughed off and replaced before the basement membrane is exposed. In the epidermis of skin in mammals, reptiles A stratified squamous epithelium consists of squamous (flattened) epithelial cells arranged in layers upon a basal membrane. Although this epithelium is referred to as squamous, many cells within the layers may not be flattened; this is due to the convention of naming epithelia according to the cell type at the surface. It forms the outermost layer of the skin and the inner lining of the mouth, esophagus and vagina. There are no intercellular spaces. exposed. Stratum corneum Hyperkeratosis and hyperplasia of the stratum corneum, often in response to excessive abrasions or impacts, can lead to the formation of hardened skin conditions such as calluses, corns and hangnails. The filamentous keratin within the cytoplasm of these cells forms a semi-impermeable cuticle that protects underlying tissues from external insults such as dehydration, infection, direct chemical exposure and mechanical abrasion. In human skin, it consists of a stratified squamous epithelium made of 15 to 20 layers of corneocytes, flattened, terminally differentiated keratinocytes that have lost their nuclei or organelles. The epidermis is composed of multiple layers of flattened cells that overlie a base layer (stratum basale) composed of perpendicular columnar cells. The layers of cells develop from stem cells in the basal layer. The thickness of the

epidermis varies from 31.2 μm for the penis to 596.6 μm for the sole of the foot with most being roughly 90 μm . Thickness does not vary between the sexes but becomes thinner with age. The human epidermis is an example of epithelium, particularly a stratified squamous epithelium. According to a 2017 poll held by the Korean Intellectual Property Office, the Italy towel was ranked as one of the top ten inventions made within the country. Among the properties of the stratum corneum are mechanical shear, impact resistance, water flux and hydration regulation, microbial proliferation and invasion regulation, initiation of inflammation through cytokine activation and dendritic cell activity, and selective permeability to exclude toxins, irritants and allergens. The corneocytes are embedded in a lipid matrix composed of ceramides, cholesterol, and fatty acids, preventing desiccation and enhancing... Different colors represent different strengths, with green being the standard. cef1cb6b2d In the epidermis of skin in mammals, reptiles, and birds, the layer of keratin in the outer layer of the stratified squamous epithelial surface is named the stratum corneum. Stratum corneum is made up of squamous cells which are keratinized and dead. These are shed periodically. cef1cb6b2d Creams are semi-solid emulsions of oil and water. They are divided into two types: oil-in-water (O/W) creams which are composed of small droplets of oil dispersed in a continuous water phase, and water-in-oil (W/O) creams which are composed of small droplets of water dispersed in a continuous oily phase. Oil-in-water creams are more comfortable and cosmetically acceptable as they are less greasy and more easily washed off using water. Water-in-oil creams are more difficult to handle but many drugs which are incorporated into creams are hydrophobic and will be released more readily from a water-in-oil cream than an oil-in-water cream. For example, the skin plays a key role in protecting the body against pathogens... cef1cb6b2d == Materials == cef1cb6b2d Keratinocytes are the predominant cells of the epidermis, the outermost layer of the skin. Living keratinocytes reside in the basal, spinous, or granular layers of the epidermis. The outermost layer of the epidermis is called the stratum corneum and it is composed of terminally differentiated keratinocytes called the corneocytes. In the absence of disease, desquamation occurs when corneocytes are individually shed unnoticeably from the surface of the skin. Typically the time it takes for a corneocyte to be formed and then shed is about 14 weeks but this time can vary depending on the anatomical location that the skin is covering. For example, desquamation occurs more slowly at acral (palm and sole) surfaces and more rapidly where the skin is thin, such as the eyelids. Normal desquamation can be visualized by immersing skin in warm or hot water; inducing the outermost layer of corneocytes to shed (such as is the case after a hot shower or bath). cef1cb6b2d

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
