

Treating Chronic Sinus Infections

Sinus is Latin for "bay", "pocket", "curve", or "bosom". In anatomy, the term is used in various contexts. The word "sinusitis" is used to indicate that one or more of the membrane linings found in the sinus cavities has become inflamed or infected. It is however distinct from a fistula, which is a tract connecting two epithelial surfaces. If left untreated, infections occurring in the sinus cavities can affect the chest and lungs. Sinusitis is a condition that affects both children and adults. It is caused by a combination of environmental and health factors. It can occur in individuals with allergies, exposure to environmental irritants, structural abnormalities of the nasal cavity and sinuses and poor immune function. Most cases are caused by a viral infection. Recurrent episodes are more likely in people with asthma, cystic fibrosis, and immunodeficiency.

Mouth infection They include dental infection, dental abscess. Mouth infections, also known as oral infections, are a group of infections that occur around the oral cavity

Functional endoscopic sinus surgery Sinusitis is an inflammation. Functional endoscopic sinus surgery (FESS) is a procedure that is used to treat sinusitis and other conditions that affect the sinuses

Humans possess four pairs of paranasal sinuses, divided into subgroups that are named according to the bones within which the sinuses lie. They are all innervated by branches of the trigeminal nerve (CN V).

Intraoral dental sinus While patients may experience discomfort during the initial infection phase, pain often subsides once the sinus tract establishes drainage, leading to delayed diagnosis and persistent low-grade infection. tract persists until the infection is treated. It is a common consequence of chronic odontogenic infections, typically resulting from untreated dental caries, pulpal necrosis, or failed endodontic treatment. Periodontal infections can also contribute to the development of intraoral sinus tracts. The condition often presents as a small, erythematous nodule or an opening on the gingiva or alveolar mucosa, which may intermittently discharge purulent material. A periodontal abscess An intraoral dental sinus is an abnormal channel that forms between a periapical infection and the oral cavity, allowing pus to drain into the mouth

It is estimated that 90–95% of all orofacial infections originate from the teeth or their supporting structures and are the most common infections in the oral and maxillofacial region. Odontogenic infections can be severe if not treated and are associated with mortality rate of 10 to 40%. Furthermore, about 70% of odontogenic infections occur as periapical inflammation, i.e. acute periapical periodontitis or a periapical abscess. The next most common form of odontogenic infection is the periodontal abscess. Despite being more common in underprivileged regions, odontogenic infections affect people from all over the world... It is the largest air sinus in the body. It has a mean volume of about 10 ml. It is situated within the body of the maxilla, but may extend into its zygomatic and alveolar processes when large. It is pyramid-shaped, with the apex at the maxillary zygomatic process, and the base represented by the lateral nasal wall.

Sinusitis rhinosinusitis and commonly known as a sinus infection, is an inflammation of the mucous membranes that line the sinuses resulting in symptoms that may include Sinusitis, also known as rhinosinusitis and commonly known as a sinus infection, is an inflammation of the mucous membranes that line the sinuses resulting in symptoms that may include production of thick nasal mucus, nasal congestion, facial congestion, facial pain, facial pressure, loss of smell, or fever

Chronic cough Infections such as pneumonia, flu, common cold, tuberculosis or other infections in the upper respiratory tract. causes irritation, can lead to chronic cough

Sinus (anatomy) In common usage, "sinus" usually refers to the paranasal sinuses, which are air cavities in the cranial bones, especially those near the nose and connecting to it. Most individuals have four paired cavities located in the cranial bone or skull. When treating fungal sinusitis A sinus is a sac or cavity in any organ or tissue, or an abnormal cavity or passage. developing sinus infections. Viral sinus infections do not, however, respond well to conventional treatments such as antibiotics

Paranasal sinuses An infection of a tooth can thus cause acute or chronic so-called odontogenic sinusitis. The sinuses are named according to the bones composing them, namely the frontal, maxillary, ethmoid and sphenoid bones. Infectious Paranasal sinuses are a group of four paired air-filled spaces that surround the nasal cavity. The maxillary sinuses are located below the eyes; the frontal sinuses are above the eyes; the ethmoidal sinuses (or ethmoid cells) are between the eyes, and the sphenoidal sinuses are behind the eyes. posterior teeth roots, located near the maxillary sinus. The evolutionary function of the sinuses is still partly debated

The etiology of intraoral dental sinuses is primarily linked to periapical abscesses, which develop when bacterial infections from the root canal system extend into periapical tissues. The path of sinus tract formation is influenced by anatomical factors such as bone density and muscle attachments, determining whether the infection drains intraorally or extraorally. If left untreated, the infection may progress to more severe complications, including osteomyelitis, cellulitis, or deep fascial space infections. It has three recesses: an alveolar recess pointed inferiorly, bounded by the alveolar process of the maxilla; a zygomatic recess pointed laterally, bounded by the zygomatic bone; and an infraorbital recess pointed superiorly, bounded by the inferior orbital surface of the maxilla. The medial wall is composed primarily of cartilage.

Maxillary sinus It is located to the side of the nasal cavity, and below the orbit. studies have found that the cause of chronic sinus infections lies in the nasal mucus, not in the nasal and sinus tissue targeted by standard treatment The pyramid-shaped maxillary sinus (or antrum of Highmore) is the largest of the paranasal sinuses, located in the maxilla. It drains into the middle meatus of the nose through the semilunar hiatus 32f8e3f436

A diagnosis of sinusitis is based on the symptoms and their duration along with signs of disease identified by endoscopic and/or radiologic criteria. Sinusitis is classified into acute sinusitis, subacute sinusitis, and chronic sinusitis. In acute sinusitis, symptoms last for less than four weeks, and in subacute sinusitis, they last between 4 and 12 weeks. In chronic sinusitis, symptoms must be present for at least 12 weeks. Odontogenic infection Odontogenic infection starts as localised infection and may remain localised to the region where it started, or spread into adjacent or distant areas. The term is derived from odonto- (Ancient Greek: ὀδούς, odoús - 'tooth') and -genic (Ancient Greek: -γενής, -γενῶς; -genés, -genôs - 'birth'). Furthermore, about 70% of odontogenic infections occur An odontogenic infection is an infection that originates within a tooth or in the closely surrounding tissues. The most common causes for odontogenic infection to be established are dental caries, deep fillings, failed root canal treatments, periodontal disease, and pericoronitis.
