Both versions of the scale have been widely adopted in clinical practice, as well as in research studies on brain injury. The Glasgow Outcome Scale (GOS) is an interview-based method used since the 1970s to assess a patient's level of recovery from brain injury. The basic scale has five broad categories: death, vegetative state, severe disability, moderate disability, or good recovery; an extended version (GOSE) of the original scale includes three sub-categories for a total of eight possible outcomes. It considers several factors such as a patient's ability to communicate, to function independently in activities of daily living (ADLs), and ability to return to work or school d1420a7389

Glasgow Coma Scale While initially primarily The Glasgow Coma Scale (GCS) is a clinical diagnostic tool widely used since the 1970s to assess a patient's level of consciousness. A GCS score can range from the lowest possible score of 3, in which a patient is completely unresponsive and is associated with a state of coma, to the best score possible of 15, in which a patient is fully alert and interactive. An initial score is used to guide immediate medical care after traumatic brain injury (such as a car accident) and a post-treatment score can

Paediatric Glasgow Coma Scale The pediatric GCS is commonly used in emergency medical services. The lowest possible PGCS (the sum) is 3 (deep coma or death) whilst the highest is 15 (fully awake and aware person). The three values separately as well as their sum are considered. Paediatric Glasgow Coma Scale (British English) or the Pediatric Glasgow Coma Score (American English) or simply PGCS is the equivalent of the Glasgow Coma Scale The Paediatric Glasgow Coma Scale (British English) or the Pediatric Glasgow Coma Score (American English) or simply PGCS is the equivalent of the Glasgow Coma Scale (GCS) used to assess the level of consciousness of child patients. As many of the assessments for an adult patient would not be appropriate for infants, the Glasgow Coma Scale was modified slightly to form the PGCS. The Glasgow Outcome Scale was first described by Bryan Jennett and Michael Bond in 1975 as a tool to characterize both survival and quality of life after brain injury. Soon after its publication, it was used in several different large clinical studies of brain injury throughout the 1970s and early 1980s. In 1981, Jennett and his colleagues expanded the 5-point original GOS by subdividing some of the original categories, resulting in the 8-point Extended Glasgow Outcome Scale (GOSE). d1420a7389

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
