The latest edition is the Fifth Edition, Text Revision (DSM-5-TR), which was released in 2022. The ICD is a broad medical classification system; mental disorders are contained in Chapter 06: Mental, behavioural or neurodevelopmental disorders (06). f7d2370a9b The DSM-5 lists several disorders in its Disruptive, Impulse-Control, and Conduct Disorders chapter, without further specifying which of those categories each disorder may belong to. ICD-11 Following an alpha version in May 2011 and a beta draft in May 2012, a stable version of the ICD-11 was released on 18 June 2018, and officially endorsed by all WHO members during the 72nd World Health Assembly on 28 May 2019. The ICD is developed and annually updated by the World Health Organization (WHO). The ICD-11 is the eleventh revision of the International Classification of Diseases (ICD). It replaces the ICD-10 as the global standard for recording The ICD-11 is the eleventh revision of the International Classification of Diseases (ICD). Development of the ICD-11 started in 2007 and spanned over a decade of work, involving over 300 specialists from 55 countries divided into 30 work groups, with an additional 10,000 proposals from people all over the world. For the diagnosis, other psychological, psychiatric, and neurological conditions must be ruled out, and they must cause distress in everyday life. In the DSM-5 it is diagnostic code 292.89 (F16.983). In the ICD-10, the diagnosis code F16.7 corresponds most closely. In accordance with the categorical approach, personality disorders are viewed as distinct types, such as avoidant or narcissistic; on the other hand, the dimensional systems employed in the ICD-11 and AMPD rate severity and pathological traits. f7d2370a9b several subtypes of depressive disorders or psychiatric syndromes featuring less severe symptoms such as dysthymic disorder (similar to MDD, but longer lasting and more persistent, though often milder) and cyclothymic disorder (similar to but milder than BD). f7d2370a9b Panic disorder is usually treated with counselling and medications. The type of counselling used is typically cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT), which is effective in more than half of people. Chapter 5 of the ICD-9, which was first published in 1977, was used in the field of psychiatry for approximately three and a half decades. In the United States, an extended version of the ICD-9 was developed called the ICD-9-CM. Several editions of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, or the DSM, interfaced with the codes of the ICD-9-CM. Following the DSM-II (1968), which used the ICD-8, the ICD-9-CM was used by the DSM-III (1980), the DSM-III-R (1987), the DSM-IV (1994), and the DSM-IV-TR (2000). The DSM-5 (2013), the current version, also features ICD-9-CM codes, listing them alongside the codes of Chapter V of the ICD-10-CM. On 1 October 2015, the United States health care system officially switched from the ICD-9-CM to the ICD-10-CM. f7d2370a9b

Diagnosis involves ruling out other potential causes of anxiety including other mental disorders, medical conditions such as heart disease or hyperthyroidism, and drug use.
