The first recorded use of the term scare quotes referring to punctuation marks was by the philosopher Elizabeth Anscombe in her 1956 essay "Aristotle and the Sea Battle", published in *Mind*. The use of a graphic symbol on an expression to indicate dubiousness goes back much further: Authors of ancient Greece used a mark called a *diple periestigmene* for that purpose. Beginning in the 1990s, the use of scare quotes became widespread. Postmodernist authors in particular... The problem here Quoting out of context (sometimes referred to as contextomy or quote mining) is an informal fallacy in which a passage is removed from its surrounding matter in such a way as to distort its intended meaning. original linguistic context in a way that distorts the source's intended meaning, a practice commonly referred to as "quoting out of context". As a fallacy, quoting out of context differs from false attribution, in that the out of context quote is still attributed to the correct source. Also described as selective quoting, the practice alters the apparent sense of a statement by omitting the surrounding material that qualifies it

The use of scare quotes is sometimes discouraged in formal or academic writing. Scare quotes may indicate that the author is using someone else's term, similar to preceding a phrase with the expression "so-called"; they may imply skepticism or disagreement, belief that the words are misused, or that the writer intends a meaning opposite to the words enclosed in quotes. Whether quotation marks are considered scare quotes depends on context, as scare quotes are not visually different from actual quotations

As a form of transcription, direct or quoted speech is spoken or written text that reports speech or thought in its original form phrased by the original speaker. In narrative, it is usually enclosed in quotation marks, but it can be enclosed in guillemets (« ») in some languages. The cited speaker either is mentioned in the tag (or attribution) or is implied. Direct speech is often used as a literary device to represent someone's point of view. Air quotes Air quotes, also called finger quotes, are virtual quotation marks formed in the air with one's fingers when speaking. The gesture is typically done with both hands held shoulder-width apart and at the eye or shoulders level of the speaker, with the index and middle fingers on each hand flexing at the beginning and end of the phrase being quoted. Air quotes are often used to express satire, sarcasm, irony or euphemism and are analogous to scare quotes in print. The 2019 film Midway also features Yamamoto speaking aloud the sleeping giant quote. d759ea8cd9 Philosophical inquiry usually centers on linguistic meaning, studying how words, sentences, and utterances acquire content and convey information. It examines how expressions describe the world and evoke emotions while distinguishing between speaker meaning and conventional meaning, and between literal and figurative meaning. Central debates address the contrast between sense and reference; the roles of vagueness, ambiguity, and context-dependence; and how the meaning of a complex expression depends on the meanings of its parts. Philosophers also discuss non-linguistic meaning associated with gestures, pictures, actions, and natural signs, such as footprints. Another topic concerns the meaning of life, asking whether human life or existence as a whole has a higher purpose. d759ea8cd9 Use of similar gestures has been recorded as early as 1927, and Glenda Farrell used air quotes in a 1937 screwball comedy, "Breakfast for Two." In 1889, in Lewis Carroll's last novel, the author described air brackets and an air question mark.
