The copper IUD was initially developed in Germany in the early 1900s, but came into widespread medical use in the 1970s. It is on the World Health Organization's List

of Essential Medicines. Early use of pessaries dates back to the ancient Egyptians, as they described using pessaries to treat pelvic organ prolapse. The term 'pessary' itself is derived from the Ancient Greek word pessós, meaning round stone used for games. Both hormonal and copper IUDs have failure rates of <1%, meaning less than 1 in 100 individuals with an IUD have an unintended pregnancy.... Use is not recommended during pregnancy but is safe with breastfeeding. The IUD with progestogen is a type of long-acting reversible birth control. It works by thickening the mucus at the opening of the cervix, stopping the buildup of the lining of the uterus, and occasionally preventing ovulation.

Dysmenorrhea can occur without an underlying problem. Underlying issues that can cause dysmenorrhea include uterine fibroids, adenomyosis, and most commonly, endometriosis. It is more common among those with heavy periods, irregular periods, those whose periods started before twelve years of age and those who have a low body weight. A pelvic exam and ultrasound in individuals who are sexually active may be useful for diagnosis. Intra-uterine devices (IUDs) are a reversible form of contraception. Women's reproductive health in the United States refers to the set of physical, mental, and social issues related to the health of women in the United States. As a result of this movement, women of the United States began to question the largely male-dominated health care system and demanded a right to information on issues regarding their physiology and anatomy.

The Department of Health and Human Services has developed a definition for sexual health in the United States based on the World Health Organization's definition of sexual health... Abnormal uterine bleeding can be caused by structural abnormalities in the reproductive tract, skipping ovulation (anovulation), bleeding disorders, hormonal issues (such as hypothyroidism) or cancer of the reproductive tract. Overall, ectopic pregnancies annually affect less than 2% of pregnancies worldwide. Risk factors for ectopic pregnancy include pelvic inflammatory disease, often due to chlamydia infection; tobacco smoking; endometriosis; prior tubal

surgery; a history of infertility; and the use of assisted reproductive technology. Those who have previously had an ectopic pregnancy are at much higher risk of having another one. Most ectopic pregnancies (90%) occur in the fallopian tube, which are known as tubal pregnancies, but implantation can also occur on the cervix, ovaries, caesarean scar, or within the abdomen...
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Copper IUD It may be used for contraception regardless of age or previous pregnancy, and may be placed immediately after a vaginal delivery, cesarean delivery, or surgical abortion. The device is placed in the uterus and lasts up to twelve years, depending on the amount of copper present in the device. It can also be used for emergency contraception within five days of unprotected sex. Rarely, the device may come out or perforate the uterine wall A copper intrauterine device (IUD), also known as an intrauterine coil, copper coil, or non-hormonal IUD, is a form of long-acting reversible contraception and one of the most effective forms of birth control available. Following its removal, fertility quickly returns. side effects include heavy menstrual periods and increased menstrual cramps (dysmenorrhea)
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IUDs are a safe and effective birth control method that can be divided into two major categories based on the mechanism the device uses to prevent pregnancy: hormonal (levonorgestrel) IUDs and copper IUDs. Both

types of IUDs can be used in most women, including adolescents, those who have never been pregnant, and those who have previously had children. They do not affect breastfeeding and can be inserted immediately after delivery. They may also be used immediately after an abortion. Globally, 19.4% of women of reproductive age use intrauterine contraception according to 2019 data. The IUD has a more invasive insertion procedure than other birth control methods. However, among birth control methods, IUDs, along with other contraceptive implants, result in the greatest satisfaction among users.

Howard J. Tatum was born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania in 1915. Tatum earned a Bachelor of Arts in chemistry in 1936 and a Ph.D. in pharmacology and toxicology in 1941. In 1945, he earned a Doctor of Medicine, and in 1949, a degree in obstetrics and gynecology.

Initial evaluation during diagnosis aims at determining pregnancy status, menopausal status, and the source of bleeding. One definition for diagnosing the condition is bleeding lasting more than 7 days or the loss of more than 80 mL of blood.

Treatment depends on the cause, severity, and interference with quality of life. Initial treatments often involve birth control pills, tranexamic acid, danazol and hormonal intrauterine device. Painkillers (NSAIDs) are also helpful. Surgery can be effective for those whose symptoms are not well-controlled with other treatments. Approximately 53 in 1000 women are affected by AUB.

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
