In its absence the plant is unable to complete a normal life cycle, or that the element is part of some essential plant constituent or metabolite. uptake of nutrients. The total essential plant nutrients include seventeen different elements: carbon, oxygen and hydrogen which are absorbed from the air and water, whereas other nutrients including nitrogen are typically obtained from the soil (exceptions include some parasitic or carnivorous plants). Underground fruiting (geocarpy) is atypical among legumes, which led botanist Carl Linnaeus to name the species *hypogaea*, from Greek 'under the earth'.
