Numerous decisions by Northern district courts have confirmed that saying terms like hestkuk (literally horsecock) to a police officer is not punishable, as it is common usage (one ruling said: "[hestekuk] is not more than one should tolerate in daily conversation."). At the same time, Northerners have been punished for using similar phrases in other parts of the country. However, a 2022 ruling by the West Finnmark district court in Northern Norway, where a man was fined 42 000 kroner after calling a police officer hestkuk, concluded that Northerners swearing was "a stigmatizing and dated idea – and under no circumstance correct", suggesting a reversal of this trend. 25bef36b9f == History... == 25bef36b9f
