

Dr Jean Martin Charcot

Block studied medicine in Paris under Charcot and received a doctorate in 1888 with a dissertation on contractions, spasms and pseudo-contractions. He then worked at the laboratory of Charcot. Blocq and Marinescu were the first physicians to describe extracellular neuritic plaque deposits in the grey matter of the brain. Also the two identified a case of Parkinsonian tremor caused by a tumor in the substantia nigra of the brain. With Marinescu and bacteriologist Victor Babeş (1854–1926), Blocq published an important work on the pathological histology of the nervous system titled *Atlas der pathologischen Histologie des Nervensystems* (1892). Blocq died at the age of 36 from paralysis or depressive psychosis in the institution of Dr. Jacques-Etienne Belhomme (1800–1880). 4f0f1a564b

Jean-Martin Charcot Jean-Martin Charcot (French: [ʒɑ̃ maʁtɛ̃ ʃaʁko]; 29 November 1825 – 16 August 1893) was a French neurologist and professor of anatomical pathology. Charcot is known as "the founder of modern neurology", and his name has been associated with at least 15 medical eponyms, including various conditions sometimes referred to as Charcot diseases. He worked on groundbreaking work about hypnosis and hysteria, in particular with his hysteria patient Louise Augustine Gleizes. 4f0f1a564b == Plot == 4f0f1a564b Cruveilhier was born in Limoges, France. As a student in Limoges, he planned to enter the priesthood. He later developed an interest in pathology, being influenced by Guillaume Dupuytren (1777-1835), a friend of Cruveilhier's father. In 1816 he earned his medical doctorate in Paris, where in 1825 he succeeded Pierre Augustin Bécclard (1785-1825) as professor of anatomy. In 1836 he relinquished the chair of anatomy to Gilbert Breschet (1784-1845), and in doing so, became the first occupant of the recently founded chair of pathological anatomy.
4f0f1a564b Eugénie, a radiant and passionate young woman from a wealthy bourgeois family in the 1880s, possessed a unique and extraordinary gift: the ability to perceive the dead through auditory and visual experiences, which caused her to enter into uncontrollable trance states. Upon discovery of her condition, her family involuntarily committed her to the neurological clinic at La Pitié Salpêtrière in Paris. There, the renowned professor Jean-Martin Charcot oversaw the "hysterics department." Charcot has been referred to as "the father of French neurology and one of the world's pioneers of neurology". His work greatly influenced the developing fields of neurology and psychology; modern psychiatry owes much to the work of Charcot and his direct followers.
