Reciprocal teaching Reciprocal teaching is an instructional method designed to foster reading comprehension through collaborative dialogue between educators and students. Rooted in the work of Annemarie Palincsar, this approach aims to improve reading in students using specific reading strategies, such as Questioning, Clarifying, Summarizing, and Predicting, to actively construct meaning from text.

The use of slow reading in literary criticism is sometimes referred to as close reading. Of less common usage is the term, "deep reading". There is little scientific evidence regarding speed reading, and as a result its value seems uncertain. Cognitive neuroscientist Stanislas Dehaene says that claims of reading up to 1,000 words per minute "must be viewed with skepticism". Guided reading was introduced as a method of teaching reading in England and Wales in 1993, through the influence of the National Literacy Strategy (later superseded by the Primary National Strategy). It is no longer supported by the Primary National Strategy from England's Department for Education.

Slow reading The concept appears to have originated in the study of philosophy and literature as a technique to more fully comprehend and appreciate a complex text. Slow reading is the intentional reduction in the speed of reading, carried out to increase comprehension or pleasure. Other types of reading and writing, such as pictograms (e.g., a hazard symbol or an emoji), are not based on speech-based writing systems. The common link is the interpretation of symbols to extract the meaning from the visual notations or tactile signals (e.g., braille). A 2020 study suggested the program's computer-based adaptive tasks and texts can improve reading self-efficacy and engagement. A 2022 study reported positive effects on learners' phonological development when teachers incorporated Reading Eggs into their instructional practices. More recently, there has been increased interest in slow reading as a result of the slow movement and its focus on decelerating the pace of modern life. Reciprocal teaching unfolds as a collaborative dialogue where teachers and students take turns assuming the role of teacher (Palincsar, 1986). This interactive approach is most effective in small-group settings, facilitated by educators or reading tutors who guide students through the comprehension process.

Guided reading reading comprehension strategies throughout the reading. "One text offers many opportunities to learn; you must decide how to mediate the text to guide the reader." Guided reading is "small-group reading instruction designed to provide differentiated teaching that supports students in developing reading proficiency". The small group model allows students to be taught in a way that is intended to be more focused on their specific needs, accelerating their progress.

National Reading Panel Particularly powerful in this regard were teaching students to summarize. The National Reading Panel (NRP) was a United States government body. Formed in 1997 at the request of Congress, it was a national panel with the stated aim of assessing the effectiveness of different approaches used to teach children to read.

== Overview == c01ddd0fd0 The term "speed reading" is thought to have been coined in the late 1950s by Evelyn Wood, a schoolteacher. She was reportedly curious why some people were naturally faster at reading, so tried to force herself to read very quickly. In 1958, while brushing off the pages of a book she had thrown, she noticed that the sweeping motion of her hand across the page caught the attention of her eyes, and helped them move more smoothly across the page. She then used the hand as a pacer. These individuals typically read at levels significantly lower than expected despite having normal intelligence. Although the disorder varies from person to person, common characteristics among people with dyslexia are difficulty with spelling, phonological processing (the manipulation of sounds), and rapid visual-verbal responding. In adults, dyslexia usually occurs after a brain injury or in the context of dementia.
