Mauthner cells first appear in lampreys (being absent in hagfish and lancelets), and are present in virtually all teleost fish, as well as in amphibians (including postmetamorphic frogs and toads). Domestication is a gradual process, so there is no precise moment in the history of a given species when it can be considered to have become fully domesticated. Many factors determine how quickly any changes may occur in a species, but there is not always a desire to improve a species from its wild form. This includes species which are semi-domesticated, undomesticated but captive-bred on a commercial scale, or commonly wild-caught, at least occasionally captive-bred, and tameable. In order to be considered fully domesticated, most species have undergone significant genetic, behavioural and morphological changes from their wild ancestors, while others have changed very little from their wild ancestors despite hundreds or thousands of years of potential selective breeding 2a804aa9a5

engineering mammals is a slow, tedious, and expensive process.
