Overurbanization The biggest cause of overurbanization emphasized by scholars is rural-urban migration and the "push" factors associated Overurbanization is a thesis originally developed by scholars of demography, geography, ecology, economics, political science, and sociology in thrergence of International Nongovernmental Organizations Amid Declining States. Several causes have been suggested, but the most common is rural-push and urban-pull factors in addition to population growth. variety of these factors are relevant. The term is intentionally comparative and has been used to differentiate between developed and developing countries

Return migration is the repatriation of a migrant. It should be distinguished from circular migration, in which migrants repeatedly travel to and from the country of origin, for example to plant and harvest crops each season.

== Motivations == The concept of overurbanization first emerged in the mid-20th century to describe cities whose rate of industrialization was growing more slowly than their rate of urbanization. According to sociologist Josef Gugler, the concept was "widely accepted in the 1950s and into the 1960s" and was split into two approaches, a diachronic and a synchronic approach. The synchronic approach, the main one taken in the

1950s, was proposed by sociologists Kingsley Davis and Hilda Golden who defined whether a country was overurbanized based on how its relationship between industrialization and urbanization compared to that of other countries during the same time period. Net migration rate A positive net migration rate indicates that there are more people entering than leaving an area. series of different push and pull factors that revolve around social, political, economical, and environmental factors according to Migration Trends. When more emigrate from a country, the result is a negative net migration rate, meaning that more people are leaving than entering the area. When the number of immigrants is larger than the number of emigrants, a positive net migration rate occurs. When there is an equal number of immigrants and emigrants, the net migration rate is balanced. The net migration rate is the difference between the number of immigrants (people coming into an area) and the number of emigrants (people leaving an area) per year divided by the population 6df29a758f

John S. MacDonald and Leatrice D. MacDonald define chain migration as "movement in which prospective migrants learn of opportunities, are provided with transportation, and have initial accommodation and employment arranged by means of primary social relationships with previous migrants". Dara Lind of Vox describes it as a process in which "[p]eople are more likely to move to where people they know live, and each new immigrant makes people they know more likely to move there in turn." Push technology and Pull technology, in network communications People moving from their home due to forced displacement (such as a natural disaster or civil disturbance) may be described as displaced persons or, if remaining in the home country, internally-displaced persons. People who flee to a different country due to political, religious, or other... Urbanization Migration is often associated with better human capital at both individual and household level, and with better access to migration networks, facilitating a possible second move. It has a high potential to improve human development, and some studies confirm that migration is the most direct route out of poverty. Age is also important for both work and non-work migration. People may migrate as individuals, in family units or in large groups. There are four major forms of migration: invasion, conquest, colonization and emigration/immigration.
