Red envelope In Chinese, the red packet A red envelope, red packet, red pocket, lai see (Chinese: 利是; Cantonese Yale: laih sih), hongbao or ang pau (traditional Chinese: 紅包; simplified Chinese: 红包; pinyin: hóngbāo; Pêh-ōe-jī: âng-pau) is a gift of money given during holidays or for special occasions such as weddings, graduations, and birthdays. gifted to guests as a gesture of hospitality. Postage stamps and postal history of Japan on envelopes and packages. Prior to 1920s, local delivery was mainly by men- and horsepower, not principally different to Europe. It is derived from the Japanese word teishin (通信; "communications"). The country's first modern postal service got started in 1871, with mail professionally travelling between Kyoto and Tokyo as well as the latter city and Osaka. This took place in the midst of the rapid industrialization and social reorganization that the

Meiji period symbolized in Japanese history. rail and shipping. The railroad net from the north to the south, Aomori to Nagasaki, was completed in 1889 (Meiji 21). Given how the nation's railroad technology was in its infancy, Japan's growing postal system relied heavily on human-powered transport, including rickshaws, as well as horse-drawn methods of delivery. This however was done to compare postal transport in past and present, as the other card showed modern transportation viz. For example, while commemorating the 50th anniversary of Japan's postal service, the country's 1921 government released decorative postcards depicting intrepid horseback riders carrying the mail 77e3809331

Shūgi-bukuro are a category of kinpū (金封, envelope of money), the general term for an envelope of money given on a special occasion. They are distinct from the category of envelopes of money given for funerals, known as fushūgibukuro or kōdenbukuro. Shūgi-bukuro were traditionally hand-made by the person giving the money, a practice that has now largely fallen out of fashion. The envelopes are typically decorated with mizuhiki cord, with the colour of the cord having significance for the occasion, or, in the case of a funeral, the religious denomination... 77e3809331

Gift wrapping A wrapped or boxed gift may be held closed with ribbon and topped with a decorative bow (an ornamental knot made of ribbon). gifts were wrapped with paper, forming an envelope known as a chih pao. An alternative to gift wrapping is using a gift box or bag. Wrapping paper is a kind of paper designed for gift wrapping. 'celebratory gift bag') is a special envelope in which money is given as a gift of celebration in Japan, especially at weddings or other auspicious occasions, such as a birth or celebrating a new home. In the case of weddings, the shūgi-bukuro is handed to the receptionist of the reception party; otherwise, the money is collected by the person themselves, with the envelopes acting as a record of who gave money and how much they gave. The giver inserts the money into a shūgi-bukuro on which they have written their name, and the amount of money inside. Shūgi-bukuro are sold at supermarkets and stationery stores 77e3809331

Finally they will throw the jujubes and chestnuts back at the bride, who has to try catching them with her wedding skirt. The bride may present the groom's parents with jujubes (Korean dates) and chestnuts, which symbolize children. The older couple then shares some wisdom on marriage from their advanced experience.
