== Signs and symptoms == 1f7f50bb8b There are no symptoms associated with the lesion itself, although many and varied symptoms and signs may be associated with the underlying cause of immunosuppression. The lesion is a white patch, which almost exclusively occurs on the lateral surfaces of the tongue, although rarely it may occur on the buccal mucosa, soft palate, pharynx or esophagus. The lesion may grow to involve the dorsal surface of the tongue. The texture is vertically corrugated ("hairy") or thickly furrowed and shaggy in appearance. 1f7f50bb8b Infectious mononucleosis ("mono" or "glandular fever"), is characterized by extreme fatigue, fever, sore throat, and swollen lymph nodes. It is primarily spread through saliva but can rarely be spread through semen or blood. Spread may occur by objects such as drinking glasses or toothbrushes, or through a cough or sneeze. Those who are infected can spread the disease weeks before symptoms develop. Mono is primarily diagnosed based on the symptoms and can be confirmed with blood tests for specific antibodies. Another typical finding is increased blood lymphocytes of which more than 10% are reactive... 1f7f50bb8b In some patients, the malignant cell clone can become the dominant proliferating cell type, leading to frank lymphoma, a group of B cell lymphomas occurring in immunosuppressed patients following organ transplant. 1f7f50bb8b

Epstein-Barr virus infection These include asymptomatic infections, the primary infection, infectious mononucleosis, and the progression of asymptomatic or primary infections to: 1) any one of various Epstein-Barr virus-associated lymphoproliferative diseases such as chronic active EBV infection, EBV+ hemophagocytic lymphohistiocytosis, Burkitt's lymphoma, and Epstein-Barr virus positive diffuse large B-cell lymphoma, not otherwise specified); 2) non-lymphoid cancers such as Epstein-Barr virus associated gastric cancer, soft tissue sarcomas, leiomyosarcoma, and nasopharyngeal cancers; and 3) Epstein-Barr virus-associated non-lymphoproliferative diseases such as some cases of the immune disorders of multiple sclerosis and systemic lupus erythematosus and the childhood disorders of Alice in Wonderland Syndrome and acute cerebellar ataxia. of Epstein-Barr virus (EBV) infection. Epstein-Barr virus It is the most common cause (90% of cases) of infectious mononucleosis The Epstein-Barr virus (EBV; EP-styne, Yiddish: [ˈɛpʃtɛjn]), also known as human herpesvirus 4 (HHV-4), is one of the nine known human herpesvirus types in the herpes family, and is one of the most common viruses in humans. EBV establishes a permanent infection in human B cells. EBV is a double-stranded DNA virus. It is the most common cause (90% of cases) of infectious mononucleosis and is also tightly linked to many malignant diseases (cancers and autoimmune diseases). EBV establishes a permanent infection in human B cells. Various vaccine formulations have been tested in humans and other animals; however, none of them were able to prevent EBV infection, and no vaccine has been approved to date. Post-transplant lymphoproliferative disorder weight loss, night sweats, and fatigue. Pain or discomfort may result from Post-transplant lymphoproliferative disorder (PTLD) is the name given to a B cell proliferation due to therapeutic immunosuppression after organ transplantation. These patients may develop infectious mononucleosis-like lesions or polyclonal polymorphic B-cell hyperplasia. Some of these B cells may undergo mutations which will render them malignant, giving rise to a lymphoma. Symptoms may be similar to those seen in infectious mononucleosis (caused by EBV) 1f7f50bb8b

== Presentation == 1f7f50bb8b Signs and symptoms of infectious mononucleosis are fever, sore throat, and swollen lymph glands. Sometimes, a swollen spleen or liver involvement may develop.

Heart problems or involvement of the central nervous system occur only rarely, and infectious mononucleosis is rarely fatal. There are... Symptoms of PTLD are highly variable and nonspecific, and may include fever, weight loss, night sweats, and fatigue. Symptoms may be similar to those seen in infectious mononucleosis (caused by EBV). Pain or discomfort may result from lymphadenopathy or mass effect from growing tumors. Dysfunction may occur in organs affected by PTLD. Lung or heart involvement may result in shortness of breath. Depending upon what definition of leukoplakia is used, hairy leukoplakia is sometimes considered a subtype of leukoplakia, or a distinct diagnosis.

Hydroa vacciniforme Epstein-Barr virus (EBV) formerly acquired by an asymptomatic or infectious mononucleosis-causing infection. 34 cases per 100,000 population. It is sometimes called "Bazin's hydroa vacciniforme". A study published in Scotland in 2000 reviewed the cases of 17 patients and estimated a prevalence of 0. It is most frequently found on the nose, cheeks, ears, dorsum of the hand, and arms (places that are most exposed to light). The rash starts as a vesicular eruption, later becoming umbilicated, and results in vacciniform scarring. It was first described in 1862 by Pierre-Antoine-Ernest Bazin. Frequently the rash first appeared in the spring or summer months and involved sun-exposed skin. In this study they reported an average age of onset of 7. It is therefore classified as one of the Epstein-Barr Hydroa vacciniforme (HV) is a very rare, chronic photodermatitis-type skin condition with usual onset in childhood. 9 years

Infectious mononucleosis The liver or spleen may also become swollen, and in less than one percent of cases splenic rupture may occur. Hairy leukoplakia It is caused by Epstein-Barr virus (EBV) and occurs usually in persons who are immunocompromised, especially those with human immunodeficiency virus infection/acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (HIV/AIDS). The white lesion, which cannot be scraped off, is benign and does not require any treatment, although its appearance may have diagnostic and prognostic implications for the underlying condition. primary EBV infection has been overcome, the virus will persist for the rest of the host's life and "hides" from the immune system by latent infection of B Hairy leukoplakia is a white patch on the side of the tongue with a corrugated or hairy appearance

Hydroa vacciniforme is commonly associated with reactivation of a latent Epstein-Barr virus (EBV) formerly acquired by an asymptomatic or infectious mononucleosis-causing infection. It is therefore classified as one of the Epstein-Barr virus-associated lymphoproliferative diseases and termed EBV+ HV. These cases of EBV+ HV may progress to another EBV+ lymphoproliferative disease such as T-cell lymphoma, T-cell leukemia...

Epstein-Barr virus-associated lymphoproliferative diseases previous infection with EBV. present in, but not contributing to, the disease. B cells, T cells, NK cells, and histiocytic-dendritic cells, are infected with the Epstein-Barr virus (EBV). Regardless Epstein-Barr virus-associated lymphoproliferative diseases (also abbreviated EBV-associated lymphoproliferative diseases or EBV+ LPD) are a group of disorders in which one or more types of lymphoid cells (a type of white blood cell), i. These LPDs include the well-known disorder occurring during the initial infection with the EBV, infectious mononucleosis, and the large number of subsequent disorders that may occur thereafter. This causes the infected cells to divide excessively, and is associated with the development of various non-cancerous, pre-cancerous, and cancerous lymphoproliferative disorders (LPDs). e. The virus is usually involved in the development and/or progression of these LPDs although in some cases it may be an "innocent" bystander, i. e. During the initial infection, the virus may cause infectious mononucleosis, only minor non-specific symptoms, or no symptoms

Post-acute infection syndrome Symptoms commonly included in definitions of PAIS include post-exertional Post-acute infection syndromes (PAISs) or infection-associated chronic conditions (IACCs) are medical conditions characterized by symptoms attributed to a prior infection. generally symptomatic. Common symptoms include post-exertional malaise (PEM), severe fatigue, neurocognitive symptoms, unrefreshing sleep, flu-like symptoms, and pain. While it is commonly assumed that people either recover or die from infections, long-term symptoms—or sequelae—are a possible outcome as well. The pathology of most of these conditions is not fully understood, and management is generally symptomatic. PAIS symptoms are often similar despite diverse prior infections. Examples include long COVID (post-acute sequelae of SARS-CoV-2 infection, PASC), myalgic encephalomyelitis/chronic fatigue syndrome (ME/CFS), and post-Ebola virus syndrome

Signs and symptoms of HIV/AIDS Acute infection (also known as primary infection) begins soon after exposure and typically lasts 2–4 weeks and may include symptoms such as fever, swollen lymph nodes, inflammation of the throat, rash, muscle pain, malaise, and mouth and esophageal sores. This is followed by the latency stage, which involves few or no symptoms, and can last anywhere from two weeks to twenty years or more.
