Dry bulk ingredients, such as sugar and flour, are measured by weight in most of the world ("250 g flour"), and by volume in North America ("1/2 cup flour"). Small quantities of salt and spices are generally measured by volume worldwide, as few households have sufficiently precise balances to measure by weight. be8f39c684

(or 160 avoirdupois ounces) of water at 62 °F Both the British imperial measurement system and United States customary systems of measurement derive from earlier English unit systems used prior to 1824 that were the result of a combination of the local Anglo-Saxon units inherited from Germanic tribes and Roman units

Most of the units of measure have been adapted in one way or another since the Norman Conquest (1066). The units of linear measure have changed the least – the yard (which replaced the ell) and the chain were measures derived in England. The foot used by craftsmen supplanted the longer foot used in agriculture. The agricultural foot was reduced to 10/11 of its former size, causing...

English units of measurement Many measures of capacity were understood as fractions or multiples of a gallon. For example, a quart is a quarter of a gallon, and a pint is half of a gallon. English units of measurement evolved from Anglo-Saxon and ancient Roman units of measurement, and were used in England up to 1826, when many were redefined or superseded by Imperial units. Various standards have applied to English units at different times, in different places, and for different applications

Apothecaries' system The apothecaries' system of measures is a similar system of volume units based on the fluid ounce. The same ounces ("an ounce is an ounce"), but the civil pound consisted of 16 ounces. For a long time, medical recipes were written in Latin, often using special symbols to denote weights and measures. Many attempts were made to reform the apothecaries' system, or apothecaries' weights and measures, is a historical system of mass and volume units that were used by physicians and apothecaries for medical prescriptions, and also sometimes by scientists. This exact form of the system was used in the United Kingdom; in some of its former colonies, it survived well into the 20th century. *Siliqua* is Latin for the seed of the carob tree. The English version of the system is closely related to the English troy system of weights, the pound and grain being exactly the same in both. It divides a pound into 12 ounces, an ounce into 8 drachms, and a drachm into 3 scruples of 20 grains each.

Today, most of the world prefers metric measurement by weight, though the

preference for volume measurements continues among home cooks in the United States and the rest of North America. Under the Constitution (article I, section 8), the Congress has the constitutional right to decide on a standard of weights and measures. On January 8, 1790, George Washington urged Congress to address the need for the uniform system of weights and measures, and on January 15, 1790, the House of Representatives requested Thomas Jefferson to draw up a plan. be8f39c684 The US Customary system of units was developed and used in the United States after the American Revolution, based on a subset of the English units used in the Thirteen Colonies. It is the predominant system of units in the United States and its territories, except for Puerto Rico and Guam, where the metric system was introduced under Spanish rule and remains prevalent. The imperial system of units was developed and used in the United Kingdom and

its empire beginning in 1824. The metric system has, to varying degrees, replaced the imperial system in the countries that once used it. be8f39c684

The US customary system is based on English systems of the 18th century, while the imperial system was defined in 1824, almost a half-century after American independence. Cooking weights and measures S. Volume is measured in imperial gallons, quarts, pints, fluid ounces, fluid drachms In recipes, quantities of ingredients may be specified by mass (commonly called weight), by volume, or by count. Weight is measured in ounces and pounds (avoirdupois) as in the U

Beer kegs are made of stainless steel, or less commonly, of aluminium. A keg has a single opening on one end, called a "bung". A tube called a "spear" extends from the opening to the other end. There is a self-closing valve that is opened by the coupling fitting which is attached when the keg is tapped. There is also an opening at the top of the spear that allows gas (usually carbon dioxide) to drive the beer out of the keg. The coupling fitting has one or two valves that control the flow of beer out of and gas into the keg. The keg must be in the upright position, that is, with the opening on top... be8f39c684 By the late 20th century, most nations of the former empire had officially adopted the metric system as their main system of measurement, but imperial units are still used alongside metric units in the United Kingdom and in some other parts of the former empire, notably Canada. be8f39c684 The Weights and Measures Act 1824 was initially scheduled to go into effect on 1 May 1825. The US customary system has a set of units for fluids, it has a different measure for dry goods for the pint, quart and barrel, and a peck and bushel for dry goods only. The imperial system has only one set of measurements, defined independently of the US customary system. be8f39c684 For most of history, most cookbooks did not specify quantities precisely, instead talking of "a nice leg of spring lamb", a "cupful" of lentils, a piece of butter "the size of a small apricot", and "sufficient" salt. Informal measurements such as a "pinch", a "drop", or a "hint" (sopçon) continue to be used from time to time. In the US, Fannie Farmer introduced the more exact specification of quantities by volume in her 1896 Boston Cooking-School Cook Book. be8f39c684 == Implementation == be8f39c684 Use of the term "English units" can be ambiguous, as, in addition to the meaning used in this article, it is sometimes

After correspondence with William Waring and others, Jefferson proposed two systems of units in mid-1790. The first was evolutionary, and was based on refinement of the definitions of the units of the existing English system, as well as simplification of their relationship to... be8f39c684 Volume may be measured either in terms of units of cubic length or with specific volume units. The units of cubic length (the cubic inch, cubic foot, cubic mile, etc.) are the same in the imperial and US customary systems, but they differ in their specific units of volume (the bushel, gallon, fluid ounce, etc.). be8f39c684

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
