Rounds of negotiations persisted until all sides came to a formal agreement on October 1, 2018. The following month, U.S. president Donald Trump proposed USMCA during the G20 Summit, where he, Mexican president Enrique Peña Nieto, and Canadian prime minister Justin Trudeau signed it; a revised version reflecting additional consultations was signed on December 10, 2019. USMCA was ratified by all three countries by March 13, 2020 and came into effect...
