== Structure == 693c738eb4 Acid reflux (GERD): stomach acid moves up into the esophagus. 693c738eb4 They are the distinguishing feature of the duodenum, and are named for the Swiss physician who first described them, Johann Conrad Brunner. 693c738eb4 It is the distal continuation of the neck of the gallbladder, from where it is directed inferoposteriorly and to the left/medially (this occurs in half of individuals). It typically terminates by uniting with the common hepatic duct to form the bile duct (usually anterior to the right hepatic artery). It usually joins the common bile duct from the right lateral side (forming an oblique angle between the two), and at such a distance that the bile duct is twice as long as the common hepatic duct. It often fuses with the common hepatic duct before actually opening into it after a variable distance (this arrangement may have the purpose of directing bile flow distally instead of back towards the liver). 693c738eb4 == Anatomy == 693c738eb4

Ampulla of Vater juice through the ampulla: the sphincter of the pancreatic duct, the sphincter of the bile duct, and the sphincter of Oddi. The common duct usually measures 2–10mm in length. This common duct usually features a dilation ("ampulla"). The common bile duct and pancreatic The ampulla of Vater, hepatopancreatic ampulla or hepatopancreatic duct is the common duct that is usually formed by a union of the common bile duct and the pancreatic duct within the wall of the duodenum. The common duct then opens medially into the descending part of the duodenum at the major duodenal papilla 693c738eb4

In a healthy individual with normal anatomy, there is no air within the biliary tree. When this finding is present, it may be secondary to: 693c738eb4 The sphincter of Oddi is a circular muscle band, or sphincter that surrounds the major duodenal papilla. 693c738eb4 protect the duodenum from the acidic content of chyme (which enters the duodenum from the stomach), 693c738eb4 Individuals with sphincter of Oddi dysfunction present with abdominal pain resembling that of structural or inflammatory disorders of the gallbladder, biliary tree or pancreas. Among other characteristics, the pain is typically in the upper part of the abdomen or in the right upper quadrant of the... 693c738eb4 == Structure == 693c738eb4 Bile is a digestive fluid made by the liver, stored in the gallbladder, and discharged into the duodenum after food is ingested to aid in the digestion of fat. Normally, the pyloric sphincter prevents bile from entering the stomach. When the pyloric sphincter is damaged or fails to work correctly, bile can enter the stomach and then be transported into the esophagus as in gastric reflux. The presence of small amounts of bile in the stomach is relatively common and usually asymptomatic, but excessive refluxed bile causes irritation and inflammation... 693c738eb4 Anismus is usually treated with dietary adjustments, such as dietary fiber supplementation. Sphincter of Boyden The pars inferior is the strongest component of the sphincter of Oddi complex. inferior. This sphincter controls the flow of bile into the pancreatic duct and it helps in filling up of the gallbladder with bile. The sphincter of Boyden controls the flow of bile from the common bile The sphincter of Boyden (also known as the choledochal sphincter) is a sphincter located in the common bile duct before it joins with the pancreatic duct to form the ampulla of vater 693c738eb4

Biliary reflux approximately 15-35% of patients, with higher rates in those with gastric emptying or sphincter of Oddi dysfunction. Bile acids are frequently present in the gastroesophageal Biliary reflux, also called bile reflux, duodenogastroesophageal reflux (DGER) or duodenogastric reflux, is a condition that occurs when bile and/or other contents like bicarbonate and pancreatic enzymes flow upward (refluxes) from the duodenum into the stomach and esophagus 693c738eb4

Anismus It can be caused by physical defects or it can occur for other reasons or unknown reasons. The internal anal sphincter forms the walls of the anal canal. Anismus that has a behavioral cause could be viewed as having similarities with parcopresis, or psychogenic fecal retention. and the end of the internal anal sphincter. It can occur in both children and adults, and in both men and women (although it is more common in women). Ascending cholangitis Part of the bile is stored in the gall bladder because of back pressure (exerted by the sphincter of Oddi), and may be released at the time of digestion Ascending cholangitis, also known as acute cholangitis or simply cholangitis, is inflammation of the bile duct, usually caused by bacteria ascending from its junction with the duodenum (first part of the small intestine). It tends to occur if the bile duct is already partially obstructed by gallstones 693c738eb4

Symptoms include tenesmus (the sensation of incomplete emptying of the rectum after defecation has occurred) and constipation. Retention of stool may result in fecal loading (retention of a mass of stool of any consistency) or fecal impaction (retention of a mass of hard stool). This mass may stretch the walls of the rectum and colon, causing megarectum and/or megacolon, respectively. Liquid stool may leak around a fecal impaction, possibly causing degrees of liquid fecal incontinence. This is usually

termed encopresis or soiling in children, and fecal leakage, soiling or liquid fecal incontinence in adults. 693c738eb4

Pneumobilia While the presence of air within biliary system is not harmful, this finding may alternatively suggest a pathological process, such as a biliary-enteric anastomosis, an infection of the biliary system, an incompetent sphincter of Oddi, or spontaneous biliary-enteric fistula. It is a common finding in patients that have recently undergone biliary surgery or endoscopic biliary procedure. It is typically detected by ultrasound or a radiographic imaging exam, such as CT, or MRI. In a healthy Pneumobilia is the presence of gas in the biliary system. as a biliary-enteric anastomosis, an infection of the biliary system, an incompetent sphincter of Oddi, or spontaneous biliary-enteric fistula 693c738eb4

These conditions are often related, and differentiating between the two can be difficult. 693c738eb4 The sphincter of Boyden is a smooth muscle sphincter surrounding the common bile duct (ductus choledocus). It occurs just before the junction with the pancreatic duct, where the ampulla of Vater is formed. Occasionally, some fibres also surround the pancreatic duct. 693c738eb4

Sphincter of Oddi dysfunction The sphincter of Oddi is a sphincter muscle, a circular band of muscle at the bottom of the biliary tree which controls the flow of pancreatic juices and bile into the second part of the duodenum. The pathogenesis of this condition is recognized to encompass stenosis or dyskinesia of the sphincter of Oddi (especially after cholecystectomy); consequently the terms biliary dyskinesia, papillary stenosis, and postcholecystectomy syndrome have all been used to describe this condition. biliary sphincter of Oddi and functional pancreatic sphincter of Oddi disorder. Both stenosis and dyskinesia can obstruct flow through the sphincter of Oddi and can therefore cause retention of bile in the biliary tree and pancreatic juice in the pancreatic duct. Cystic duct production of hepatic bile, contraction of the gall bladder, and relaxation of the Sphincter of Oddi. The bile duct was once thought to possess a sphincteric function The cystic duct is the duct that (typically) joins the gallbladder and the common hepatic duct; the union of the cystic duct and common hepatic duct forms the bile duct (formerly known as the common bile duct). Its length varies 693c738eb4

Cholangitis can be life-threatening, and is regarded as a medical emergency. Characteristic symptoms include yellow discoloration of the skin or whites of the eyes, fever, abdominal pain, and in severe cases, low blood pressure and confusion. Initial treatment is with intravenous fluids and antibiotics, but there is often an underlying problem (such as gallstones or narrowing in the bile duct) for which further tests and treatments may be necessary, usually in the form of endoscopy to relieve obstruction of the bile duct. The word is from Greek chol-, bile + ang-, vessel + -itis, inflammation. 693c738eb4 The cystic duct typically measures (sources differ) 2–4 cm/2–3 cm in length (though its length has been known to range from 0.5 cm to 9 cm), and 2–3 mm in diameter.
