

Tropical Storm Ernesto Hurricane

Tropical Storm Ernesto (1994) – formed southwest of Cape Verde and dissipated without affecting land. At least three deaths have been tied to Ernesto, all related to rip currents from the hurricane along the East Coast of the United States and \$520 million in damages were done by Ernesto.

2012 Atlantic hurricane season 25 days. Another record was set by Hurricane Nadine later in the season; the system became the fourth-longest-lived tropical cyclone ever recorded in the Atlantic, with a total duration of 22. It moved ashore in North Florida on May 29 with winds of 65 mph (105 km/h), making it the strongest pre-season storm to make landfall in the Atlantic basin. The 2012 season was also a costly one in terms of property damage, mostly due to Hurricane Sandy. This was the first occurrence of two pre-season named storms in the Atlantic basin since 1951. The 2012 season The 2012 Atlantic hurricane season was the final year in a string of three consecutive very active seasons since 2010, with 19 tropical storms. The season officially began on June 1 and ended on November 30, dates that conventionally delimit the period during each year in which most tropical cyclones form in the Atlantic Ocean. However, Alberto, the first named system of the year, developed on May 19 – the earliest date of formation since Subtropical Storm Andrea in 2007. A second tropical cyclone, Beryl, developed later that month. 2012 Atlantic hurricane season was the final year in a string of three consecutive very active seasons since 2010, with 19 tropical storms. The final storm to form, Tony, dissipated. This season marked the first time since 2009 where no tropical cyclones formed in July.

Following the formation of the system, tropical storm watches and warnings were issued for the Windward Islands. Hurricane watches and warnings were extended for nearby Caribbean Islands in the days following as Ernesto trekked

across the central Caribbean Sea. 2018 Atlantic hurricane season Archived (PDF) from The 2018 Atlantic hurricane season was the third in a consecutive series of above-average and damaging Atlantic hurricane seasons dating back to 2016, featuring 15 named storms, 8 hurricanes, and 2 major hurricanes, which caused a total of over \$50 billion (2018 USD) in damages and at least 172 deaths. These dates historically describe the period in each year when most tropical cyclones form in the Atlantic basin and are adopted by convention. The season officially began on June 1, 2018, and ended on November 30, 2018. However, subtropical or tropical cyclogenesis is possible at any time of the year, as demonstrated by the formation of Tropical Storm Alberto on May 25, making this the fourth consecutive year in which a storm developed before the official start of the season. 2006 Atlantic hurricane season 2006 was the first season since 2001 in which no hurricanes made landfall in the United States, and was the first since 1994 in which no tropical cyclones formed during October. Instead, it turned out to be a below average season, as activity was slowed by a rapidly forming moderate El Niño event, the presence of the Saharan Air Layer over the tropical Atlantic, and the steady presence of a robust secondary high-pressure area to the Azores High centered on Bermuda. The first cyclone, Tropical Depression One, developed in the southern Gulf of Mexico on June 7 and dissipated after an uneventful duration. The hurricane season officially began on June 1, and ended on November 30. It was slightly above average due to a La Niña weather pattern, although most of the storms were weak. However, it would be almost two months before the first named storm, Alberto, formed near Cape Verde; Alberto also dissipated with no effects on land. Four additional storms—Tropical Depression Nine, Florence, Isaac, and Joyce—minimally affected land areas 3187f71ea1

Hurricane Ernesto (2006) The sixth tropical storm and first hurricane of the season Hurricane Ernesto was the costliest tropical cyclone of the 2006 Atlantic hurricane season. After turning to the northeast, it re-intensified and made landfall on August 31 on the North Carolina coast just below hurricane status. Despite initial predictions for it to track through the eastern Gulf of Mexico as a major hurricane, Ernesto moved across eastern Florida as a weak tropical storm. Late the next day, Ernesto became extratropical after entering southern Virginia. Hurricane Ernesto was the costliest tropical cyclone of the 2006 Atlantic hurricane season. Ernesto first affected the northern Caribbean, reaching minimal hurricane status near Haiti before weakening and moving across eastern Cuba as a tropical storm. The sixth tropical storm and first hurricane of the season, Ernesto developed from a tropical wave on August 24 in the eastern Caribbean Sea. The remnants spread moisture across the northeastern United States before dissipating over eastern Canada on September 4 3187f71ea1

1982 Atlantic hurricane season The season officially began on June 1, 1982, and lasted until November 30, 1982. Activity started early with Hurricane Alberto forming on the second day of the season. 1994 Atlantic hurricane season The season officially started on June 1 and ended on November 30, dates which conventionally limit the period each year when most tropical cyclones tend to form in the Atlantic Ocean. The season was unusual in that it produced no major hurricanes, which are those of Category 3 status or higher on the Saffir–Simpson hurricane scale. The season produced seven named tropical cyclones and three hurricanes, a total well below the seasonal average. Moving westward, the system developed into a tropical depression in the central Atlantic, and further into a tropical storm prior to entering the Caribbean Sea. The system encountered high wind shear south of Jamaica but subsequently reached its peak intensity as a Category 2 hurricane as it made landfall on the Yucatán Peninsula 3187f71ea1
