Common side effects of suxamethonium chloride include low blood pressure, increased saliva production, muscle pain, and rash. Possible serious side effects include malignant hyperthermia, hyperkalemia and allergic reactions. The use of suxamethonium chloride is not recommended in the treatment of people who are at risk of hyperkalemia (high blood potassium) or with history of myopathy. Use during pregnancy appears to be safe.

== Extraction ==

Polyvinyl chloride is a white, brittle solid. It is soluble in ketones, chlorinated solvents, dimethylformamide, THF and DMAc.

Chloride salts such as sodium chloride are often soluble in water. It is an essential electrolyte located in all body fluids responsible for maintaining acid/base balance, transmitting nerve impulses and regulating liquid flow in and out of cells. Other examples of ionic chlorides include potassium chloride (KCl), calcium chloride (CaCl₂), and ammonium chloride (NH₄Cl). Examples of covalent chlorides include methyl chloride (CH₃Cl), carbon tetrachloride (CCl₄), sulfuryl chloride (SO₂Cl₂), and monochloramine (NH₂Cl).

Blood doping can be achieved by making the body produce more red blood cells itself using drugs, giving blood transfusions either from another person or back to the same individual, or by using blood substitutes. Many methods of blood doping are illegal, particularly in professional sports where it is considered to give an artificial advantage to the

competitor. Anti-doping agencies use tests to try to identify individuals who have been blood doping using a number of methods, typically by analyzing blood samples from the competitors.

Unlike alcohol, for which impairment can be reasonably measured using a breathalyser (and confirmed with a blood alcohol content measurement), valid detection for cannabis is time-consuming, and tests cannot determine an approximate degree of impairment. The lack of suitable tests and agreed-upon intoxication levels is an issue in the legality of cannabis, especially regarding intoxicated driving. The KB test is the standard method of quantitating fetal-maternal hemorrhage (FMH). It takes advantage of the differential resistance of fetal hemoglobin to acid. A standard blood smear is prepared from the mother's blood and exposed to an acid bath. This removes adult hemoglobin, but not fetal hemoglobin, from the red blood cells.
