== Diseases ==

Dogs were the first species to be domesticated over 14,000 years ago, before the development of agriculture, though genetic studies suggest the domestication process may have begun over 25,000 years ago. Also called the domestic dog, it was selectively bred during the Late Pleistocene by hunter-gatherers. Due to their long association with humans, dogs have gained the ability to thrive on a starch-rich diet that would be inadequate for other canids. Dogs and the modern gray wolf share a common ancestor. Compared to humans, dogs possess a superior sense of smell and hearing, but inferior visual acuity. Dogs perform many roles for humans, such as hunting. The dog (*Canis familiaris* or *Canis lupus familiaris*) is a domesticated descendant of wolves.

Genetic evidence indicates that fleas are a specialised lineage of parasitic scorpionflies (Mecoptera) *sensu lato*, most closely related to the family Nannochoristidae. == Adult morphology == Ancylostomiasis is caused when hookworms, present in large numbers, produce an iron deficiency anemia by sucking blood from the host's intestinal walls.

Ancylostomiasis If humans come into contact with larvae of dog hookworms or cat hookworms, or of certain other hookworms that do not infect humans, the larvae Ancylostomiasis is a hookworm disease caused by infection with *Ancylostoma* hookworms. intestine. The name is derived from Greek *ancylos* ἀγκύλος "crooked, bent" and *stoma* στόμα "mouth"

Dog health is viewed holistically; it encompasses many different aspects, including disease processes, genetics, and nutritional health, for example. Infectious diseases that affect dogs are important not only from a veterinary standpoint, but also because of the risk to public health; an example of this is rabies. Genetic disorders also affect dogs, often due to selective breeding to produce individual dog breeds. Due to the popularity of both commercial and homemade dog foods, nutrition is also a heavily studied subject. Depending on the organism, the signs and symptoms vary. *Ancylostoma duodenale* and *Necator americanus* can enter the blood stream while *Ancylostoma braziliensis* cannot. Flea They lack wings; their hind legs are extremely well adapted for jumping. Fleas have appeared in poetry, literature, music and Flea, the common name for the order Siphonaptera, includes 2,500 species of small flightless insects that live as external parasites of mammals and birds. Their claws keep them from being dislodged, and their mouthparts are adapted for piercing skin and sucking blood. Flea larvae are worm-like, with no limbs; they have chewing mouthparts and feed on organic debris left on their hosts' skin. Some species can leap 50 times their body length, a feat second only to jumps made by another group of insects, the superfamily of froghoppers. on specific mammals may use other mammals as hosts; thus, humans may be bitten by cat and dog fleas. Adult fleas grow to about 3 millimetres (1⁄8 inch) long, are usually dark in color, and have bodies that are "flattened" sideways or narrow, enabling them to move through their hosts' fur or feathers. Fleas live by ingesting the blood of their hosts

Ancylostomiasis is also known as miner's anaemia, tunnel disease, brickmaker's anaemia and Egyptian chlorosis. Helminthiasis may also refer to ancylostomiasis, but this term also refers to all other parasitic worm diseases as well. In the United Kingdom, if acquired in the context of working in a mine, the condition is eligible for Industrial Injuries Disability Benefit. It is a prescribed disease (B4) under the relevant legislation. § Signs and symptoms *Trichodectes canis* is a louse of the suborder Mallophaga, or chewing lice. *T. canis* is a small, flat-bodied louse. Males are typically smaller than females, with body lengths ranging from 1.60 to 1.68 mm in males and 1.75 to 1.82 mm in females. Females also differ from males in the fact that they possess a special organ that is located from underneath the end of the abdomen. This organ, when seen from above, resembles two bowed appendages on either side of the genital region. This organ serves two purposes – in helping to glue the eggs to hosts' fur, and to grasp fur in order to remain on the host. As a member... Adult worm scolex is rhomboidal in shape with a transverse diameter of 250–500 um. Dogs have been bred for desired behaviors, sensory capabilities, and physical attributes. Dog breeds vary widely in shape, size, and color. They have the same number of bones (with the exception of the tail), powerful jaws that house around 42 teeth, and well-developed senses of smell, hearing, and sight. It is a common zoological behavior, being found in toothed animals such as mammals, reptiles, amphibians, fishes, and arthropods. Myocytic contraction of the muscles of mastication is responsible for generating the force that initiates the preparatory jaw abduction (opening), then rapidly adducts (closes) the jaw and moves the top and bottom teeth towards each other, resulting in the forceful action of a bite. Wolf How wolves react to humans depends largely on their prior experience The wolf (Canis lupus; pl. : wolves), also known as the grey wolf or gray wolf, is a canine native to Eurasia and North America. The wolf is nonetheless related closely enough to smaller Canis species, such as the coyote and the golden jackal, to produce fertile hybrids with them. More than thirty subspecies of Canis lupus have been recognized, including the dog and dingo, though grey wolves, as popularly understood, include only naturally occurring wild subspecies. The wolf is the largest wild extant member of the family Canidae, and is further distinguished from other Canis species by its less pointed ears and muzzle, as well as a shorter torso and a longer tail. been pervasive in many societies, though humans are not part of the wolf's natural prey. The wolf's fur is usually mottled white, brown, grey, and black, although subspecies in the arctic region may be nearly all white a393716ca4

Gravid proglottids containing the worm's microscopic eggs are either passed in the definitive host's feces or may leave their host spontaneously and are then ingested by microscopic flea larvae (the intermediate hosts) in the surrounding environment. As in all members of family Dipylidiidae, proglottids of the adult worm have genital pores on both sides (hence the name double-pore tapeworm). Each side has a set of male and female reproductive organs. The uterus is paired with 16 to 20 radial branches each. The scolex has a retractable rostellum with four rows of hooks, along with the four suckers that all cyclophyllid cestodes have. a393716ca4 Bites often result in serious puncture wounds, avulsion injuries, fractures, hemorrhages, infections... a393716ca4

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
