The lower part of the stay apparatus consists of the suspensory apparatus, which is the same in both front and hind legs, while the upper portion of the stay apparatus is different between the fore and hind limbs. d646a19536

Stay apparatus It is best known as the mechanism by which horses can enter a light sleep while still standing The stay apparatus is an arrangement of muscles, tendons, and ligaments that work together so that an animal can remain standing with virtually no muscular effort. can remain standing with virtually no muscular effort. The relatively slim legs of certain large mammals, such as horses and cows, would be subject to dangerous levels of fatigue if not for the stay apparatus. The effect is that an animal can distribute its weight on three limbs while resting a fourth in a flexed, non-weight-bearing position. It is best known as the mechanism by which horses can enter a light sleep while still standing up. The animal can periodically shift its weight to rest a different leg, and thus all limbs are able to be individually rested, reducing overall wear and tear d646a19536

Horse Horses in the subspecies caballus are domesticated, although some domesticated populations live in the wild as feral horses. Female horses, called The horse (*Equus ferus caballus*) is a domesticated, one-toed, hoofed mammal. These feral populations are not true wild horses, which are horses that have never been domesticated. There is an extensive, specialized vocabulary used to describe equine-related concepts, covering everything from anatomy to life stages, size, colors, markings, breeds, locomotion, and behavior. The horse has evolved over the past 45 to 55 million years from a small multi-toed creature, *Eohippus*, into the large single-toed animal of today, originally in North America. Humans began domesticating horses around 4000 BCE in Central Asia, primarily associated with the Botai culture; and their domestication is believed to have been widespread by 3000 BCE. trait: horses are able to sleep both standing up and lying down, with younger horses tending to sleep significantly more than adults. It belongs to the taxonomic family Equidae and is one of two extant subspecies of *Equus ferus* d646a19536

Horse behavior Horses can sleep both standing up and lying down. indicating tension or resistance. They can sleep while standing, an adaptation from life as a prey Horse behavior is best understood from the view that horses are prey animals with a well-developed fight-or-flight response. Their first reaction to a threat is often to flee, although sometimes they stand their ground and defend themselves or their offspring in cases where flight is untenable, such as when a foal would be threatened d646a19536

Sleep in animals The three categories of biological sleep schedules are diurnal, nocturnal, and crepuscular which characterize species whose waking periods mostly overlap with day, night, and twilight respectively. Horses and other herbivorous ungulates can sleep while standing, but must necessarily lie down for REM sleep (which causes muscular atony) for short Sleep is broadly considered a biological necessity in virtually all animals. In all of these taxa except sponges, regulation of sleep is documented to involve genes whose transcription oscillates with time, known as circadian or clock genes. These genes and the gene networks they regulate give rise to the internal circadian clock. The various criteria which biologists use to define sleep states have been observed in all other animal phyla, often with profound variation in function. Specific sleep patterns and durations vary widely among and sometimes within sleeping species, with some sleeping or foregoing sleep for extended periods. The large majority of such taxa with documented sleep physiology are bilaterians, though there is increasing evidence of sleep or sleep-like states in non-bilaterians such as *Cassiopea* jellyfish and hydra (both cnidarians), and sponges. Others, such as some porpoises, engage in unihemispheric sleep where only one brain hemisphere sleeps at a time in order to d646a19536
