Childhood immunizations in the United States The schedule for childhood immunizations in the United States (US) is published and routinely updated by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The schedule includes vaccines of several different types against viral and bacterial infections including hepatitis B, rotavirus, diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, Haemophilus influenzae type b, pneumococcal disease, polio, influenza, varicella, hepatitis A, measles, mumps, rubella, meningococcal disease, and human papillomavirus. Childhood immunization in the US has been affected by recurring vaccine hesitancy and anti-vaccine activism, including concerns about vaccine safety, vaccine ingredients, and the number and timing of recommended vaccines. It takes 10 to 21 days after Vaccines provide immunity to children before exposure to potentially serious infectious diseases, and play a central role in preventing the spread of diseases with epidemic potential. This imbalance leads some medical experts to argue that the main agent of death during major outbreaks of "smallpox" in 1789 and in 1829–1831 was in fact chickenpox. This is a disease to which the British were largely immune but which, in a virgin soil epidemic, can produce symptoms very similar to smallpox. It never became widely established among the colonists, killing only about 100 of them over the next 100 years, and mostly in port-city outbreaks that were traced to visiting ships. Yet a smallpox outbreak in 1789 devastated the Aboriginal people near the Sydney colony, killing perhaps half of them, while sparing the British.

Smallpox The last naturally occurring case was diagnosed in October 1977, and the World Health Organization certified the global eradication of the disease in 1980, making smallpox the only human disease to have been eradicated. Virgin-soil epidemic With malaria spreading in the Caribbean islands after European-African contact, the In epidemiology, a virgin-soil epidemic is an epidemic in which populations that previously were in isolation from a pathogen are immunologically unprepared upon contact with the novel pathogen. Virgin-soil epidemics have occurred with European settlement, particularly when European explorers and colonists took diseases to lands they settled in the Americas, Australia and Pacific Islands. smallpox, influenzas, tuberculosis, measles, and potentially chickenpox

The first fatal victim was a nurse, the daughter of a hospital cleaner, who had been in contact with the infected individual. The state of epidemic was declared on July 17 and lifted on September 19. A total of 99 people contracted the disease (most of them healthcare workers), of whom seven died, including four doctors and nurses. The youngest patient was five months old, the oldest was 83.

Mildred W. Wells Her research into indoor air quality, ventilation, and germicidal ultraviolet light helped establish modern approaches to infection control. In these studies, Wells analyzed Mildred W. (October 1, 1891 – 23 February 1957), born Mildred Washington Weeks, was an American scientist and public health researcher who is best known for her work on the transmission of airborne disease. Relative to husband, her contributions to aerobiology and infection control are historically under-recognized, however she is increasingly acknowledged as an equally key figure in the development of both of these fields. A trained physician and a critical collaborator with her husband, William Firth Wells, she played a foundational role in developing the science behind droplet and aerosol behavior, now central to understanding the spread of respiratory infections like measles and tuberculosis. The initial symptoms of the disease included fever and vomiting. This was followed by formation of ulcers in the mouth and a skin rash. Over a number of days, the skin rash turned into the characteristic fluid-filled blisters with a dent in the center. The bumps then scabbed over and fell off, leaving scars. The disease was transmitted from one person to another primarily through prolonged face-to-face contact with an infected person or rarely via contaminated objects. Prevention was achieved mainly through the smallpox vaccine. Once the disease had developed, certain antiviral medications could have helped, but such medications did not become available until after the disease was eradicated. The risk of death was about 30%, with higher rates among babies. Often, those who survived had extensive scarring of their skin, and some were left blind. The city was paralyzed and isolated from the rest of the country by a sanitary cordon for several weeks. Although the disease spread beyond Wrocław, it was treated in five voivodeships. Shingles is caused by the varicella zoster virus (VZV) that also causes chickenpox. During an outbreak of shingles, exposure... Chickenpox is an airborne disease that easily spreads via human-to-human transmission, typically through the coughs and sneezes of an infected person. The incubation period is 10–21 days, after which the characteristic rash appears. It may be spread from one to two days before the rash appears until all lesions have crusted over. It may also spread through contact with the blisters. Those with shingles may spread chickenpox to those who are not immune through contact with the blisters. Shingles In the case of chickenpox, also called varicella, the Shingles, also known as herpes zoster or zona, is a viral disease characterized by a painful skin rash with blisters in a localized area. If the rash involves the eye, vision loss may occur. Shingles is caused by the varicella zoster virus (VZV) that also causes chickenpox. Typically the rash occurs in a single, wide mark either on the left or right side of the body or face. The rash usually heals within four weeks, but some people develop ongoing nerve pain which can last for months or years, a condition called postherpetic neuralgia (PHN). In those with poor immune function the rash may occur widely. Other common symptoms are fever, headache, and tiredness. Two to four days before the rash occurs, there may be tingling or local pain in the area
