As of 2006, it was the only proven type of necrotic arachnidism in humans. While there is no known therapy effective for loxoscelism, there has been research on antibiotics, surgical timing, hyperbaric oxygen, potential antivenoms and vaccines. == Description == 1b00a96ddb Most spiders do not cause bites that are of importance. For a bite to be significant, substantial envenomation is required. Bites from the widow spiders involve a neurotoxic venom which produces a condition known as latrodectism. Symptoms may include pain which may be at the bite or involve the chest and abdomen, sweating, muscle cramps and vomiting among others. Bites from the recluse spiders cause the condition loxoscelism, in which local necrosis of the surrounding skin and widespread breakdown of red blood cells may occur. Headaches, vomiting and a mild fever may also occur. Other spiders that can cause significant bites include the Australian funnel-web spider and South American wandering spider. 1b00a96ddb

Loxosceles, commonly known as "recluse spiders" or "violin spiders", are distributed nearly worldwide in warmer areas. *Hexophthalma* (sand spiders) and *Sicarius* (assassin or sand spiders) live in the deserts of southern Africa and South to Central America, respectively. They are known for their self-burying behavior and the ability to go long periods without food or water. 1b00a96ddb All members have six eyes arranged in three groups of two (dyads). Violin spiders are usually brownish with a darker brown characteristic violin marking on the cephalothorax. They are also haplogyne, meaning the females possess unsclerotised genitals. 1b00a96ddb Loxoscelism was first described in the United States in 1879 in Tennessee. Although there are up to 13 different *Loxosceles* species in North America (11 native and two non-native), *Loxosceles reclusa*, also known as the Brown Recluse, Fiddleback, or Violin spider, is the species most often involved in serious envenomation. *L. reclusa* has a limited habitat that includes the Southeast United States. In South America, *L. laeta*, *L. intermedia* (found in Brazil and Argentina), and *L. gaucho* (Brazil) are the three species most often reported to cause necrotic bites. 1b00a96ddb This spider is found in the eastern half of southern California, the southern tip of Nevada, the western half of Arizona, throughout northern, central, eastern, and southwestern New Mexico, the southwestern corner of Utah and into northwestern Mexico. 1b00a96ddb

Most spider bites are managed with supportive care such as nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (including ibuprofen) for pain and antihistamines for itchiness... Brown recluse spiders are usually between 6 and 20 millimetres (0.24 and 0.79 in), but may grow larger. While typically light to medium brown, they range in color from whitish to dark brown or blackish gray. The cephalothorax and abdomen are not necessarily the same color. These spiders usually have markings on the dorsal side of their cephalothorax, with a black line coming from it that looks like a violin with the neck of the violin pointing to the rear of the spider, resulting in the nicknames fiddleback spider, brown fiddler, or violin spider. == Distribution == Pathophysiology == Medical reports have been criticized for poor evidence. In the last century, both white tailed and wolf spiders were considered medically significant, only to be recanted. Only ten genera (*Atrax*, *Phoneutria*, *Loxosceles*, *Latrodectus*, *Hadronyche*, *Macrothele*, *Missulena*, *Illawarra*, *Sicarius*, and *Hexophthalma*) are considered medically significant. Bites of these spiders have a range of severity, with only a minority having severe symptoms. Deaths by verified spider bites are exceedingly rare (e.g. not one in Australia since 1979).

Spider bite Bites from the recluse spiders cause the condition A spider bite, also known as arachnidism, is an injury resulting from the bite of a spider. Most bites result in mild symptoms around the area of the bite. The effects of most bites are not serious. Rarely they may produce a necrotic skin wound or severe pain. which may be at the bite or involve the chest and abdomen, sweating, muscle cramps and vomiting among others

Only a small percentage of species have bites that pose a danger to people. Many spiders do not have mouthparts capable of penetrating human skin. While venoms are by definition toxic substances, most spiders do not have venom that is toxic to humans (in the quantities delivered) to require medical attention. Of those that do, fatal outcomes are rare. == Relation with other spiders == Hexophthalma and Sicarius resemble crab spiders and lack this marking. Along with the tarantulas, these are some of the longest living spiders, some living up to fifteen years old. Most *Loxosceles* can live for one and a half to two years. It dwells in the wild, and its only domestic occurrence is that near native vegetation, avoiding urban areas in the desert and even green lawns. The spiders are particularly dense in packrat dens. == Description == Sicariidae are of the superfamily Scytodoidea.

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Other families in the Scytodoidea include Drymusidae, Scytodidae, and Periegopidae. The desert recluse is commonly misidentified as *L. unicolor* (of South America) or as *L. reclusa* (the brown recluse of the southern and midwestern states), two spiders which do not live anywhere near the vicinity. Recluse spiders are now identified as members of the family Sicariidae, having formerly been placed in their own family, the Loxoscelidae. Although recluse spiders are feared, they are usually not aggressive.

Pathophysiology of spider bites Ed: in 100 pictures retrieved The pathophysiology of a spider bite is due to the effect of its venom. A spider envenomation occurs whenever a spider injects venom into the skin. Physicians have reported brown recluse spider bites where no brown recluse exist. Not all spider bites inject venom – a dry bite, and the amount of venom injected can vary based on the type of spider and the circumstances of the encounter. are much more common than spider bites. Some spider bites do leave a large enough wound that infection may be a concern. The mechanical injury from a spider bite is not a serious concern for humans. However, it is generally the toxicity of spider venom that poses the most risk to human beings; several spiders are known to have venom that can cause injury to humans in the amounts that a spider will typically inject when biting

Loxosceles deserta It is found in Mexico and the United States. == Characteristics ==

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
