== Medicinal uses == 000669d48b The condition is treatable and need not shorten the animal's life span or interfere with the quality of life. If left untreated, the condition can lead to cataracts, increasing weakness in the legs (neuropathy), malnutrition, ketoacidosis, dehydration, and death. 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Ringer's lactate solution It may also be used to treat metabolic acidosis and to wash the eye following a chemical burn. It is given by intravenous infusion or applied to the affected area. It is used for replacing fluids and electrolytes in those who have low blood volume or low blood pressure. It is very similar to Hartmann's solution and the two solutions are often used interchangeably. administered intravenously or subcutaneously. Administering the fluids subcutaneously allows the solution to be readily given to the animal by a trained Ringer's lactate solution (RL), also known as sodium lactate solution or Lactated Ringer's (LR), is a mixture of sodium chloride, sodium lactate, potassium chloride, and calcium chloride in water 000669d48b

It is important to distinguish that there is a very significant difference between intestinal human tapeworm infection and human coenurosis. Humans are the definitive hosts for some tapeworm species, the most common being *T. saginata* and *T. solium* (beef and pork tapeworms). This means that these species can develop into full grown, reproductively capable adult worms within the human body. People infected with these species have a tapeworm infection. In contrast, the four species that cause human coenurosis can only grow into mature, reproductively capable worms inside their definitive hosts, canids such as dogs, wolves, foxes and coyotes. Humans who ingest eggs from any of these four species of *Taenia* become intermediate hosts, or places where the eggs can mature into larvae but not into adult worms. When humans ingest these eggs, the eggs develop into tapeworm larvae that group within cysts known as coenuri, which can be seen in the central nervous system, muscles, and subcutaneous tissues of infected humans. People with coenurosis... 000669d48b A hypodermic needle is used for rapid delivery of liquids, or when the injected substance cannot be ingested, either because it would not be absorbed (as with insulin), or because it would harm the liver. It is also useful to deliver certain medications that cannot be delivered orally due to vomiting. There are many possible routes for an injection, with intramuscular (into a muscle) and intravenous (into a vein) being the most common. 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Canine parvovirus Treatment often involves veterinary hospitalization. Felines (cats) are also susceptible to panleukopenia, a different strain of parvovirus. The fluids are typically Canine parvovirus (also referred to as CPV, CPV2, or parvo) is a contagious virus mainly affecting dogs and wolves. IV fluids are administered and antinausea and antibiotic injections are given subcutaneously, intramuscularly, or intravenously. enrofloxacin. Vaccines can prevent this infection, but mortality can reach 91% in untreated cases. CPV is highly contagious and is spread from dog to dog by direct or indirect contact with their feces. Canine parvovirus often infects other mammals including foxes, cats, and skunks 000669d48b

Maropitant mildly reduces intra-procedural inhaled anesthesia dose requirements but does not confer analgesia itself. 000669d48b

Polysulfated glycosaminoglycan In vitro studies have shown it to inhibit the enzymes that degrade cartilage and bone, as well as suppress inflammation and stimulate the synthesis of replacement cartilage. glycosaminoglycan (PSGAG; sold under the brand name Adequan) is an injectable drug for dogs and horses that is used to alleviate the limpness, pain, and lowered range Polysulfated glycosaminoglycan (PSGAG; sold under the brand name Adequan) is an injectable drug for dogs and horses that is used to alleviate the limpness, pain, and lowered range of motion caused by arthritis. PSGAG is one of the most widely prescribed joint treatments for horses. It is made of repeat disaccharide units (comprising hexosamine and hexuronic acid), and is similar to glycosaminoglycans already present in the cartilage; PSGAG thus easily integrates itself there. While it can cause an increased risk of bleeding, it is relatively safe and has a high LD50 000669d48b

Cerebral shunt: In cases of hydrocephalus and other conditions that cause chronic increased intracranial pressure, a one-way valve is used to drain excess cerebrospinal fluid from the brain and carry it to other parts of the body. This valve usually sits outside the skull but beneath the skin, somewhere behind the ear. Cerebral

shunts that drain fluid to the peritoneal cavity (located in the upper abdomen) are called ventriculoperitoneal (VP) shunts. 000669d48b Injectable maropitant is used in dogs to treat and prevent acute vomiting; tablets are used for preventing vomiting from a variety of causes, though it requires a higher dose to prevent vomiting from motion sickness. The injectable version is also licensed for preventing and treating acute vomiting in cats. 000669d48b Lumbar-peritoneal shunt (a.k.a. lumboperitoneal, LP): In cases of chronic increased intracranial pressure such as idiopathic intracranial hypertension and hydrocephalus, a tube or shunt with or without a one-way valve is used to drain the excess cerebrospinal fluid from the brain and transport it to the peritoneal... 000669d48b

Maropitant It was approved by the FDA in 2007, for use in dogs and in 2012, for cats. Maropitant is given orally, subcutaneously, and intravenously. Maropitant is only indicated for dogs at least 16 weeks old, as some very young Maropitant , sold under the brand name Cerenia among others, when used as maropitant citrate (USAN), is a neurokinin-1 (NK1) receptor antagonist developed by Zoetis specifically for the treatment of motion sickness and vomiting in dogs. cannot vomit 000669d48b

PSGAG is mostly used in dogs and horses for treating traumatic arthritis and degenerative joint disease (osteoarthritis). It has shown to be better at treating acute than chronic arthritis, though some studies say that... 000669d48b Dogs that develop the disease show signs of the illness within three to ten days. The signs may include lethargy, vomiting, fever, and diarrhea (usually bloody). Generally, the first sign of CPV is lethargy. Secondary signs are loss of weight and appetite or diarrhea followed by vomiting. Diarrhea and vomiting result in dehydration that upsets the electrolyte balance and this may affect the dog critically. Secondary infections occur as a result of the weakened immune system. Because the normal intestinal lining is also compromised, blood and protein leak into the intestines, leading to anemia and loss of protein, and endotoxins escape into the bloodstream... 000669d48b Ringer's solution was invented in the 1880s by British clinician, physiologist and pharmacologist Sydney Ringer; lactate was added... 000669d48b Side effects may

include allergic reactions, high blood potassium, hypervolemia, and high blood calcium. It may not be suitable for mixing with certain medications and some recommend against use in the same infusion as a blood transfusion. Ringer's lactate solution has a lower rate of acidosis as compared with normal saline. Use is generally safe in pregnancy and breastfeeding. Ringer's lactate solution is in the crystalloid family of medications. It is isotonic, i.e. it has the same tonicity as blood. 000669d48b

Taenia serialis In definitive hosts, T. These coenuri can occur in humans within their muscles, brain, eye, or subcutaneous connective tissue though humans are neither the definitive nor intermediate Taenia serialis, also known as a canid tapeworm, is found within canines such as foxes and dogs. serialis is acquired by eating tissues from a variety of intermediate hosts. serialis intermediate host. serialis are parasites of carnivores, particularly dogs, with herbivorous lagomorph mammals such as rabbits and hares, serving as intermediate hosts. == Veterinary uses == 000669d48b Hatching of the T. serialis usually occurs only if the eggs have been exposed to gastric secretions proceeded by intestinal secretions. The oncospheres hatch in the intestine,

invade the intestinal wall, and are carried in the blood throughout the tissues.
