It alludes to Jean Louise Finch's view of her father, Atticus Finch, as the moral compass ("watchman") of Maycomb, Alabama, and has a theme of disillusionment as she discovers the extent of the bigotry in her home community. On 22 June 1910, Lee married Frances Cunningham Finch, the daughter of a local postmaster in Monroe County, the unincorporated community of Finchburg being named after an ancestor. They had three daughters. His youngest daughter, Harper Lee, wrote the award-winning novel *To Kill a Mockingbird*. Though he had few years of formal education (and none at a college), Lee passed the Alabama teacher's exam, and moved to Monroe County, Alabama to teach. Atticus Finch A preliminary version Atticus Finch is a fictional character and the protagonist of Harper Lee's Pulitzer Prize-winning novel of 1960, *To Kill a Mockingbird*. Atticus is a lawyer and resident of the fictional Maycomb County, Alabama, and the father of Jeremy "Jem" Finch and Jean Louise "Scout" Finch. A preliminary version of the character also appears in the novel *Go Set a Watchman*, written in the mid-1950s, but not published until 2015. Atticus Finch is a fictional character and the protagonist of Harper Lee's Pulitzer Prize-winning novel of 1960, *To Kill a Mockingbird*. Lee based the character on her own father, Amasa Coleman Lee, an Alabama lawyer, who, like Atticus, represented black defendants in a highly publicized criminal trial. He represents the African-American man Tom Robinson in his trial where he is charged with rape of Mayella Ewell. Through his unwavering dedication to upholding justice and fighting for what is right, Atticus becomes an iconic symbol of moral integrity and justice
