It was an inexpensive, ersatz cloth made from wood fibers, basically cellulose (a kind of Rayon viscose), that started to disintegrate after three or four washings and was highly flammable. In general, the warp threads were of cotton yarn, and the weft consisted of twisted Sufu yarn. Modern chemistry during the Industrial Revolution invented products that made life more affordable and convenient. One major product was rayon. Of the three ways to manufacture it, the British firm of George Courtauld & Co. purchased the patent for the manufacturing of 'viscose' rayon in 1906. Perfecting the manufacturing process, they looked to the exploding population of the United States to establish manufacturing.

The material is commonly referred to in the industry as viscose rayon. "Lyocell" has become a genericised trademark used to refer to the Lyocell process for making cellulose fibres. The United States Federal Trade Commission defines Lyocell as "a fiber composed of cellulose precipitated from an organic solution in which no substitution of the hydroxy groups takes place, and no chemical intermediates are formed". It classifies the fibre as a sub-category of rayon.

Other trademarked names for Lyocell fibres are Tencel (Lenzing AG), Newcell (Akzo Nobel), and Seacell (Zimmer AG). The Aditya Birla Group also sells it under the brand name Excel. There are other manufacturers, such as Sateri, who sell their product under the generic name Lyocell. Bamboo fibres are all cellulose fibre extracted or fabricated from natural bamboo, but they vary widely.

Courtaulds Red Scar Works Preston At the time of closure, one reason given by management for the closure was the rising popularity of steel belt radial tyres, thus reducing demand for viscose tyre yarn. The factory was connected by rail as a branch of what was the Preston and Longridge Railway. A range of deniers of this were produced; pigmented variants were Matt (pigmented with titanium dioxide) and a wide range of colours trademarked Duracol (including Duracol Black, pigmented with carbon black). The closure of the works was announced in November 1979 and the issue raised in the UK Parliament House of Commons by the constituency MP. It was located in Ribblesdale, Preston, off Longridge Road. Two main products were manufactured: one being tyre yarn made by a process known as CSPT (Continuous Spinning Process), trademarked Tenasco, in two principle deniers; the other being a general-purpose textile yarn called Bright. At the time of closure, approximately 2,600 people were employed there, but there were approximately 4,000 at its peak. Red Scar Works was built in 1939 by Courtaulds and produced continuous filament viscose rayon 1ea7599ec6

Synthetic fiber They are the result of extensive research by scientists aimed at replicating naturally occurring animal and plant fibers. The name 'rayon' was adopted in 1924, with 'viscose' being used for the Synthetic fibers or synthetic fibres (in British English; see spelling differences) are fibers made by humans through chemical synthesis, as opposed to natural fibers that are directly derived from living organisms, such as plants like cotton or fur from animals. (Note: each single unit of a polymer is called a monomer). The word 'polymer' comes from the Greek prefix 'poly,' which means 'many,' and the suffix 'mer,' which means 'single units'. In general, synthetic fibers are created by extruding fiber-forming materials through spinnerets, forming a fiber. first commercial viscose rayon was produced by the UK company Courtaulds in 1905.
