Military in Greenland The Joint Arctic Command is the Danish military branch responsible for Greenland. The Danish military has personnel based at several locations in Greenland and patrols its waters and skies. As Denmark is a member of NATO, Greenland is within its area of responsibility, meaning that its member states must respond to any attack on Greenland. There are regular Danish-NATO military exercises in Greenlandic waters. History of Greenland Their descendants most likely died out and were The history of Greenland is a history of life under extreme Arctic conditions: currently, an ice sheet covers about eighty percent of the island, restricting human activity largely to the coasts. The ancestors of the Greenlandic Inuit who live there today appear to have migrated there later, around the year 1200, across the Nares Strait from northern Canada. Their descendants most likely died out and were replaced and succeeded by several other human groups migrating from continental North America since then. There has been no evidence discovered that Greenland was known to Norsemen until the 9th century AD, when Norse Icelandic explorers settled on its southwestern coast. Greenland joined the then European Community in 1973 with Denmark, but after gaining autonomy in 1979 with the introduction of home rule within the Kingdom of Denmark, Greenland voted to leave in 1982 and left in 1985, to become an OCT. The main reasons for leaving were disagreements about the Common Fisheries Policy and to regain control of Greenlandic fish resources, to subsequently remain outside EU waters.

Norse settlements in Greenland They appear to have developed their own dialect of Old Norse, now called Greenlandic Norse, not to be confused with the Eskaleut Greenlandic language. The Thule people, ancestors of modern Greenlandic Inuit, began migrating into Greenland around 1200 CE, bringing advanced Arctic maritime technologies that allowed them to thrive in the environment and eventually becoming the dominant population by 1300 CE. The settlers, known as Grænlingar ('Greenlanders' in Icelandic and not to be confused with modern Greenlanders), were the first Europeans to explore and temporarily settle North America. There were talks within the US federal government about purchasing Greenland in 1867, advocated by Secretary of State William H. Seward. Since 1949, Greenland has been under the protection of NATO, of which the US and Denmark are both members. However, in 1916, the United States proclaimed their recognition of Danish sovereignty over all Greenland as a condition for their purchase of the Virgin Islands in the Treaty of the Danish West Indies. Greenland does not have its own military. In the 21st century, Donald Trump proposed acquisition of Greenland during his presidency.
