Social ecological model Socioecological models were introduced to urban studies by sociologists associated with the Chicago School after the First World War as a reaction to the narrow scope of most research conducted by developmental psychologists. These models bridge the gap between behavioral theories that focus on small settings and anthropological theories. In his initial theory, Bronfenbrenner Socio-ecological models were developed to further the understanding of the dynamic interrelations among various personal and environmental factors. 2005, Urie Bronfenbrenner's Ecological Framework for Human Development applies socioecological models to human development fd4803b601

Bioecological model The bioecological model is strongly influenced by

Bronfenbrenner's collaborations with Stephen Ceci. Whereas earlier statements of ecological systems theory focused on characteristics of the environment, the goal of the bioecological model was to explicate how characteristics of the developing person influenced the environments to which the person was exposed and how they were affected by the environment. Whereas much of Bronfenbrenner's work had focused on social development and the influence of social environments on development, Ceci's work focuses on memory and intelligence. It focuses on the world outside the developing person and how they were affected by it. After publication of *The Ecology of Human Development*, Bronfenbrenner's first comprehensive statement of ecological systems theory, additional refinements were added to the theory. model of development is the mature and final revision of Urie Bronfenbrenner's ecological system theory. == Background == fd4803b601 Childhood is divided into three stages of life which include early childhood, middle childhood, and late childhood (preadolescence). Early childhood typically ranges from infancy to the age of 6 years old. During this period, development is significant, as many of life's milestones happen during this time period such as first words, learning to crawl, and learning to walk. Middle childhood/preadolescence or ages 6-10 universally mark a distinctive period between major developmental transition points. Adolescence often begins around the onset of puberty, marked as menarche or spermatarche, occurring between 10 and 12 years of age, and ends upon acquiring the age of maturity. Adolescence is characterized by

maturation of the body, increase in capacity for learning, and emergence of personal identity. Developmental change may occur as a result of genetically controlled processes, known as maturation, or environmental factors and learning... fd4803b601 Biracial identity development includes self-identification. Urie Bronfenbrenner His theory states Urie Bronfenbrenner (April 29, 1917 – September 25, 2005) was a Russian-born American psychologist best known for using a contextual framework to better understand human development. periods of time. Bronfenbrenner's writings about the limitations of understanding child development solely from experimental laboratory research and the potential for using contextual variability to provide insight into developmental processes was important in changing the focus of developmental psychology. " It is from this vantage point that Bronfenbrenner conceives his theory of human development, the ecological systems theory. This framework, broadly referred to as 'ecological systems theory', was formalized in an article published in American Psychologist, articulated in a series of propositions and hypotheses in his most cited book, The Ecology of Human Development and further developed in The Bioecological Model of Human Development and later writings. These beliefs were exemplified in his involvement in developing the US Head Start program in 1965. He argued that natural experiments and applied developmental interventions provide valuable scientific opportunities fd4803b601

In his initial theory, Bronfenbrenner postulated that to understand human development, the entire ecological system in which development occurs must be taken into account. In subsequent revisions, Bronfenbrenner acknowledged the relevance of biological and genetic factors in human development. fd4803b601

Cognitive development A major controversy in cognitive development has been "nature Cognitive development is a field of study in neuroscience and psychology focusing on a child's development in terms of information processing, conceptual resources, perceptual skill, language learning, and other aspects of the developed adult brain and cognitive psychology. These aspects begin to develop around 18 months of age, as infants engage with their environment playing with toys, listening to their parents, watching television, and responding to various stimuli that capture their attention. Cognitive development is defined as the emergence of the ability to consciously cognize, understand, and articulate their understanding in adult terms. Cognitive information development is often described in terms of four key components: reasoning, intelligence, language, and memory. Another such model of cognitive development is Bronfenbrenner's Ecological Systems Theory. Cognitive development is how a person perceives, thinks, and gains understanding of their world through the relations of genetic and learning factors. Qualitative differences between how a child processes their waking experience and how an adult processes their waking experience are acknowledged (such as object permanence, the understanding of logical relations, and cause-effect reasoning in school-age children) fd4803b601
