

Do Root Canals Cause Cancer

Root resorption most commonly occurs due to inflammation caused by pulp necrosis, trauma, periodontal treatment, orthodontic tooth movement and tooth whitening. Less common causes include pressure from malpositioned ectopic teeth, cysts, and tumors.

Intraoral dental sinus locate, clean and shape, or obturate all canals within the root canal system. The condition often presents as a small, erythematous nodule or an opening on the gingiva or alveolar mucosa, which may intermittently discharge purulent material. While patients may experience discomfort during the initial infection phase, pain often subsides once the sinus tract establishes drainage, leading to delayed diagnosis and persistent low-grade infection. It is a common consequence of chronic odontogenic infections, typically resulting from untreated dental caries, pulpal necrosis, or failed endodontic treatment. Additionally, lateral canals containing necrotic debris and inflammatory An intraoral dental sinus is an abnormal channel that forms between a periapical infection and the oral cavity, allowing pus to drain into the mouth

Because very early... == Pathogenicity == The majority of back pain is nonspecific and idiopathic. Common underlying mechanisms include degenerative or traumatic changes to the discs and facet joints, which can then cause secondary pain in the muscles and nerves and referred pain to the bones, joints and extremities. Diseases and inflammation of the gallbladder, pancreas, aorta and kidneys may also cause referred pain in the back. Tumors of the vertebrae, neural tissues and adjacent structures can also manifest as back pain.

Tooth resorption However, pathological root resorption occurs in the permanent or secondary dentition and sometimes in the primary dentition. Root resorption is a normal physiological process that occurs in the exfoliation of the primary dentition. Canal walls may appear sclerosed, thus the outline of pulp chambers or root canals may not be Resorption of the root of the tooth, or root resorption, is the progressive loss of dentin and cementum by the action of odontoclasts, a tooth-related osteoblast. the root canal may be visible with well-defined borders

Periapical periodontitis acute or chronic inflammatory lesion around the apex of a tooth root, most commonly caused by bacterial invasion of the pulp of the tooth. Other causes can include occlusal trauma due to 'high spots' after restoration work, extrusion from the tooth of root filling material, or bacterial invasion and infection from the gums. It is a likely Periapical periodontitis or apical periodontitis (AP) is an acute or chronic inflammatory lesion around the apex of a tooth root, most commonly caused by bacterial invasion of the pulp of the tooth. Periapical periodontitis may develop into a periapical abscess, where a collection of pus forms at the end of the root, the consequence of spread of infection from the tooth pulp (odontogenic infection), or into a periapical cyst, where an epithelial lined, fluid-filled structure forms. It is a likely outcome of untreated dental caries (tooth decay), and in such cases it can be considered a sequela in the natural history of tooth decay, irreversible pulpitis and pulpal necrosis

Cementoma is characterized by a significant amount of thickening of the cementum around the roots of the teeth. The main teeth involved can include deciduous and permanent teeth, impacted molars and premolars. The growth is typically benign and painless. Although symptoms may not be noticeable, a dull pain and dentin hypersensitivity can occur as growth increases. Visibility of the cementoma may increase with growth and cause distortion/swelling to the face and surrounding areas along with tooth displacement. Histological analyses reveal... While overlap exists between humans and... Gemella morbillorum is rarely a cause of disease in humans, though it may be found benignly in the oropharyngeal area. Infections, when found, are similar to viridans Streptococci in range. Cases have been reported of endovascular infections (predominantly endocarditis) and also acute invasive infections. It has also been reported as among the most common bacteria present in teeth with cysts that do not resolve after repeated root canal treatments. The mesentery of the small intestine arises from the root of the mesentery (or mesenteric root) and is the part connected with the structures in front of the vertebral column. The root is narrow, about 15 cm long, 20 cm in width, and is directed obliquely from the duodenojejunal flexure at the left side of the second lumbar vertebra... This genus was first reported in the oral cavity and is found specifically in the salivary microbiome. Cementoma A periapical form is also recognized. It is found most commonly in the mandible in the region of the lower molar teeth, occurring between the ages of 8 and 30 in both sexes with equal frequency. Considerable thickening of the cementum can often be observed. Odontomas have mixed radio density and usually are not continuous into the root. It causes distortion of surrounding areas but is usually a painless growth, at least initially. Hypercementosis present Cementoma is an odontogenic tumor of cementum. Gemella morbillorum Gemella morbillorum is a species of bacteria within the genus Gemella. A report of a human infection involving G. most common bacteria present in teeth with cysts that do not resolve after repeated root canal treatments. It is a facultative anaerobic Gram positive coccus usually preferring capnophilic or microaerophilic environments. The etiology of intraoral dental sinuses is primarily linked to periapical abscesses, which develop when bacterial infections from the root canal system extend into periapical tissues. The path of sinus tract formation is influenced by anatomical factors such as bone density and muscle attachments, determining whether the infection drains intraorally or extraorally. If left untreated, the infection may progress to more severe complications, including osteomyelitis, cellulitis, or deep fascial space infections. 6a6fae34d1 The mesocolon (the part of the mesentery that attaches the colon to the abdominal wall) was formerly thought to be a fragmented structure, with all named parts—the ascending, transverse, descending, and sigmoid mesocolons, the mesoappendix, and the mesorectum—separately terminating their insertion into the posterior abdominal wall. However, in 1925, new microscopic and electron microscopic examinations showed the mesocolon to be a single structure derived from the duodenojejunal flexure and extending to the distal mesorectal layer. Thus the mesentery is an internal organ. 6a6fae34d1 While resorption of bone is a normal physiological response to stimuli throughout the body, root resorption in permanent dentition and sometimes in the primary dentition is pathological. The root is protected internally (endodontium) by pre-dentin and externally on the root surface by cementum and the periodontal ligament. Back pain The pain may be characterized as a dull ache, shooting or piercing pain or a burning sensation. A foraminotomy or foraminectomy may also be necessary, if the vertebrae are causing significant nerve root compression Back pain (Latin: dorsalgia) is pain felt in the back. Discomfort can radiate to the arms and hands as well as the legs or feet, and may include numbness or weakness in the legs and arms. An episode of back pain may be acute, subacute or chronic depending on the duration. spinal canal in the case of spinal stenosis. It may be classified as neck pain (cervical), middle back pain (thoracic), lower back pain (lumbar) or coccydynia (tailbone or sacral pain) based on the segment affected. Mesentery It helps (among other functions) in storing fat and allowing blood vessels, lymphatics, and nerves to supply the intestines.
