Less than 10 percent of the total site has been preserved since European-American settlement; this area contains a total of 206 acres (83 ha). == Description == 37d510a039 == History == 37d510a039 Shrum Mound stands on a high bluff on the west side of the Scioto River, measuring approximately 20 feet (6 m) in height and about 100 feet (30 m) in diameter. The mound is bordered by an active quarry lake known locally as the McKinley Avenue Quarry, operated by the Columbus Division of Water; limestone was extracted there from the late 19th century into the early 20th century, after which the exhausted quarry filled with water. Beginning in the 1970s the city used the flooded quarry as a repository for residual byproducts of municipal water treatment; as of 2026 the city has undertaken a large dredging project there, citing the site's limited remaining capacity. 37d510a039 The United States Department of the Interior designated the mound as a National Historic Landmark in 1966. It is maintained by the Ohio History Connection, a nonprofit organization dedicated to preserving historical sites in Ohio. 37d510a039 The first published surveys of the mound, by E. G. Angel Mounds The large residential and agricultural community was constructed and inhabited from AD 1100 to AD 1450, and served as the political, cultural, and economic center of the Angel chiefdom. It extended within 120 miles (190 km) of the Ohio River valley to the Green River in present-day Kentucky. The town had as many as 1,000 inhabitants inside the walls at its peak, and included a complex of thirteen earthen mounds, hundreds of home sites, a palisade (stockade), and other structures. The mound stands with a width varying between 22 and 24 ft (6.7 and 7.3 m) based on the section.
