Venoms kill through the action of at least four major classes of toxin, namely necrotoxins and cytotoxins, which kill cells; neurotoxins, which affect nervous systems; myotoxins, which damage muscles; and haemotoxins, which disrupt blood clotting. 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The venom glands that secrete zootoxins are a modification of the parotid salivary glands found in other vertebrates and are usually located on each side of the head, below and behind the eye, and enclosed in a muscular sheath. Antivenoms are typically produced using a donor animal, such as a horse or sheep, due to ethical and practical concerns with real humans. The donor animal is hyperimmunized with non-lethal doses of one or more venoms to produce a neutralizing antibody response. Then, at certain intervals, the blood (or blood serum) from the donor animal is collected and neutralizing antibodies are purified from the blood to produce an antivenom. d2c32d2094

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
