Ode to a Nightingale The poem is one of the most frequently anthologized in the English language. Inspired by the bird's song, Keats composed the poem in one day. It was written either in the garden of the Spaniards Inn, Hampstead, London, or, according to Keats' friend Charles Armitage Brown, under a plum tree in the garden of Keats' house at Wentworth Place, also in Hampstead. It was first published in Annals of the Fine Arts the following July. The exact date of "Ode to a Nightingale", as well as those of "Ode on Indolence", "Ode on Melancholy", and "Ode on a Grecian Urn", is unknown, as Keats "Ode to a Nightingale" is a poem by John Keats, one of his 1819 odes. According to Brown, a nightingale had built its nest near the house that he shared with Keats in the spring of 1819

The Well Wrought Urn appropriateness is Brooks's analysis of Keats's "Ode on a Grecian Urn". It is considered a seminal text in the New Critical school of literary criticism. Widely considered to be one of his best poems, Keats's "Ode" ends on what many think The Well Wrought Urn: Studies in the Structure of Poetry is a 1947 collection of essays by Cleanth Brooks. The title contains an allusion to the fourth stanza of John Donne's poem, "The Canonization", which is the primary subject of the first chapter of the book

The poem tells how the god Hermes hears of a nymph who is more beautiful than all. Hermes, searching for the nymph, instead comes across Lamia, trapped in the form of a serpent. She reveals the previously invisible nymph to him and, in return, he restores her human form. She goes to seek a youth of Corinth, Lycius, while Hermes and his nymph depart together into the woods. The relationship between Lycius and Lamia, however, is destroyed when the sage Apollonius reveals Lamia's true identity at their wedding feast, whereupon she seemingly disappears and Lycius dies of grief. Keats was never a professional writer. Instead, he supported himself with a small income that he earned as a surgeon for Guy's Hospital. At the age of 23, Keats left the hospital, losing his source of income, in order to devote himself to writing poetry. He lived with Charles Brown, a friend who collected Keats's poetry while supporting him, during spring 1819 and composed poetry. The early products of this effort included La Belle Dame sans Merci and "Ode to Psyche", the first of a...

Ekphrasis Ekphrastic writing also has scholarly value, and has recently become a common method in art history scholarship. John Keats's "Ode on a Grecian Urn" is another frequently cited example of ekphrasis. In the poem, the Ekphrasis (from the Greek ἐκ and φράσις) is a rhetorical device defined as the written description of a work of art, either real or imagined. In addition to its descriptive qualities, in classical antiquity, ekphrasis was also used to evoke strong emotional responses in the reader, by using enargeia, or vivid language, and evidentia, or evidence, to prompt images in the reader's mind's eye. Since classical antiquity, ekphrasis has been used as a technique in poetry, but is frequently employed in other genres of literature as well. Romantic era, and again among the pre-Raphaelite poets

In five stanzas of ten lines each, the poet addresses an ancient Greek urn, describing and discoursing upon the images depicted on it. In particular he reflects upon two scenes, one in which a lover pursues his beloved, and another where villagers and a priest gather to perform a sacrifice. The poet concludes that the urn will say to future generations of mankind: "Beauty is Truth... == Background == "Ode to a Nightingale" is a personal poem which describes Keats' journey into the state of negative capability. The tone rejects the optimistic pursuit of pleasure found within Keats's earlier poems and, instead, explores the themes of nature, transience and mortality, the latter being particularly relevant to Keats. The nightingale described experiences a type of death but does not actually die. Instead, it is capable of living through its song, a fate that humans cannot expect. The poem ends with an acceptance that pleasure cannot last and that death is an inevitable part of... Literary close reading and commentaries have extensive precedent in the exegesis of religious texts, and more broadly, hermeneutics of ancient works. For example, Pazand, a genre of middle Persian literature, refers to the Zend (literally: 'commentary'/'translation') texts that offer explanation and close reading of the Avesta, the sacred texts of Zoroastrianism. The scriptural commentaries of the Talmud offer a commonly cited early predecessor to close reading. In Islamic studies, the close reading of the Quran has produced an immense corpus. Frye gained international fame with his first book, Fearful Symmetry (1947), which led to the reinterpretation of the poetry of William Blake. His lasting reputation rests principally on the theory of literary criticism that he developed in Anatomy of Criticism (1957), one of the most important works of literary theory published in the twentieth century. The American critic Harold Bloom commented at the time of its publication that Anatomy established Frye as "the foremost living student of Western literature." Frye's contributions to cultural and social criticism spanned a long career during which he earned widespread recognition and received many honours.

Ode to Psyche The poem is the first of his 1819 odes, which include "Ode on a Grecian Urn" and "Ode to a Nightingale". Keats attempts this by dedicating an "untrodden region" of his mind to the worship of the neglected goddess. "Ode to Psyche" is a poem by John Keats written in spring 1819. "Ode to Psyche" is an experiment in the ode genre, and Keats's attempt at an expanded version of the sonnet format that describes a dramatic scene. Keats uses the imagination to show the narrator's intent to resurrect Psyche and reincarnate himself into Eros (love). The poem is the first of his 1819 odes, which include "Ode on a Grecian Urn" and "Ode to a Nightingale". "Ode to Psyche" is a poem by John Keats written in spring 1819. The poem serves as an important departure from Keats's early poems, which frequently describe an escape into the pleasant realms of one's imagination.

The work was composed on 19 September 1819 and published in 1820 in a volume of Keats's poetry that included Lamia and The Eve of St. "To Autumn" is the final work in a group of poems known as Keats's "1819 odes". The work marks the end of his poetic career, as he needed to earn money and could no longer devote himself to the lifestyle of a poet. wrote many of his major odes: "Ode on a Grecian Urn", "Ode on Indolence", "Ode on Melancholy", "Ode to a Nightingale", and "Ode to Psyche". Although personal problems left him little time to devote to poetry in 1819, he composed "To Autumn" after a walk near Winchester one autumnal evening. After the month "To Autumn" is a poem by English Romantic poet John Keats (31 October 1795 – 23 February 1821). A little over a year after the publication of "To Autumn", Keats died in Rome.

After finishing the spring poems, Keats wrote in June 1819 that its composition brought him more pleasure than anything else he had written that year. The poem describes the state of indolence, a word which is synonymous with "avoidance" or "laziness". Unlike the other odes he wrote that year, "Ode on Indolence" was not published until 1848, 27 years after his death. The work was written during a time when Keats was presumably more than usually occupied with his material prospects.

The Well Wrought Urn is divided into eleven chapters, ten of which attempt close readings of celebrated English poems from verses in Shakespeare's Macbeth to Yeats's "Among School Children". The eleventh, famous chapter, entitled "The Heresy of Paraphrase", is a polemic against the use of paraphrase in describing and criticizing a poem. This chapter is followed by two appendices: "Criticism, History, and Critical Relativism" and "The Problem of Belief". Most of the book's contents had been previously published before 1947, and the position it articulates is not significantly different from Brooks's earlier books, Understanding Poetry and Modern Poetry and the Tradition. The unique contribution of The Well Wrought Urn is that it combines the close reading analysis of the previous volumes while answering some of the criticism... The poem is an example of Keats's break from the structure of the classical form. It follows the poet's contemplation of a morning spent in idleness. Three figures are presented—Ambition, Love and Poesy—dressed in "placid sandals" and "white robes". The narrator examines each using a series of questions and statements on life and art. The poem concludes with the narrator giving up on having all three of the figures as part of his life. Some critics regard "Ode on Indolence" as inferior to the other four...

Northrop Frye society and the outer world. Lyric poetry, for instance, like Keats's "Ode on a Grecian Urn", is predominantly centripetal, stressing the sound and movement. Herman Northrop Frye (July 14, 1912 – January 23, 1991) was a Canadian literary critic and literary theorist, considered one of the most influential of the 20th century.

The poem has three eleven-line stanzas which describe a progression through the season, from the late maturation of the crops to the harvest and to the last days of autumn when winter is nearing. The imagery is richly achieved through the personification of Autumn, and the description of its bounty, its sights and sounds. It has parallels in the work of English landscape artists, with Keats himself describing the fields of stubble that he saw on his walk as conveying the warmth of "some pictures". The poem is one of the "Great Odes of 1819", which also include "Ode on Indolence", "Ode on Melancholy", "Ode to a Nightingale", and "Ode to Psyche". Keats found existing forms in poetry unsatisfactory for his purpose, and in this collection he presented a new development of the ode form. He was inspired to write the poem after reading two articles by English artist and writer Benjamin Haydon. Through his awareness of other writings in this field and his first-hand acquaintance with the Elgin Marbles, Keats perceived the idealism and representation of Greek virtues in classical Greek art, and
