Kidney (vertebrates) The kidneys are the main The kidneys are a pair of organs of the excretory system in vertebrates, which maintain the balance of water and electrolytes in the body (osmoregulation), filter the blood, remove metabolic waste products, and, in many vertebrates, also produce hormones (in particular, renin) and maintain blood pressure. All vertebrates have kidneys. In healthy vertebrates, the kidneys maintain homeostasis of extracellular fluid in the body. vertebrates, depending on the species, may include the ureter, urinary bladder, cloaca, and urethra. When the blood is being filtered, the kidneys form urine, which consists of

water and excess or unnecessary substances. The urine is then excreted from the body through other organs, which in vertebrates, depending on the species, may include the ureter, urinary bladder, cloaca, and urethra

The ureters have been identified for at least two thousand years, with the word ureter stemming from the stem uro- relating to urinating and seen in written records since at least the time of Hippocrates. It is, however, only since the 16th century that the term "ureter" has been consistently used to refer to the modern structure, and only since the development of medical imaging in the 20th century that techniques such as X-ray, CT, and ultrasound have been able to view the ureters... creates an osmotic barrier: urine osmotic concentration can range from 50 to 1200 mmol/L while the normal concentration is 290 mmol/L. The difference between the two could lead to fluid entering or exiting the ureter due to the osmotic pressure. Urge incontinence due to an overactive bladder == Medical uses == It is the second-most common birth defect of the male reproductive system, affecting about one of every 250 males at birth, although when including milder cases, is found in up to 4% of newborn males. No studies have been done to estimate the percentage of hypospadias in newborn females. The reproductive organs develop from the intermediate mesoderm and are preceded by more primitive structures that are superseded before birth. These embryonic structures are the mesonephric ducts (also known as Wolffian ducts) and the paramesonephric ducts, (also known as Müllerian ducts). The mesonephric duct gives rise to the male seminal vesicles, epididymides and vasa deferentia. The paramesonephric duct gives rise to the female fallopian tubes, uterus, cervix, and upper part of the vagina. It encompasses around 10 different diseases of the lower urinary tract, all of which can present with very similar symptoms:

Feline lower urinary tract disease The majority of uroliths are located in the urinary bladder, but can also form in the kidneys, ureters and urethra. When the Urinary incontinence (UI), also known as involuntary urination, is any uncontrolled leakage of urine. Urinary incontinence is common in older women and has been identified as an important issue in geriatric health care. == Mesonephric ducts == Stress incontinence due to "a poorly functioning urethral sphincter muscle (intrinsic sphincter deficiency) or to hypermobility of the bladder neck or urethra" Along with frogs and earthworms, fetal pigs are among the most common animals used in classroom dissection. There are several reasons for this, including that pigs, like humans, are mammals. Shared traits include common hair, mammary glands, live birth, similar organ systems, metabolic levels, and basic body form. They also allow for the study of fetal circulation, which differs from that of an adult. Fetal pigs are easy to obtain at a relatively low price because they are by-products of the meat-packing industry. These pigs are not bred and killed for this purpose, but are extracted from the deceased sow's uterus. Fetal pigs not used in classroom dissections are often used in fertilizer or simply discarded. Fourthly, fetal pigs are easy to dissect because of their soft tissue and incompletely developed bones that are still made of cartilage. In addition, they are relatively large with well... Roughly 90% of male cases are the less serious distal hypospadias, in which the urethral opening (the meatus) is on or near the head of the penis (glans). The remainder have proximal hypospadias, in which the meatus is located on the shaft of the penis, near or within the scrotum. Shiny tissue or anything that typically forms the urethra instead extends from the meatus to the tip of the glans; this tissue is called the urethral plate.

Fetal pig Pigs, as a mammalian species, provide a good specimen for the study of physiological systems and processes due to the similarities between many pig and human organs. connects to the vas deferens. Stenosis is the narrowing of a ureter, often caused by chronic inflammation. Congenital abnormalities can cause development of two ureters on the same side or abnormally placed ureters. Cystectomy The most common condition warranting removal of the urinary bladder is bladder cancer. Radical cystectomy with the creation of a urinary diversion can be associated with several risks and complications Cystectomy is a medical term for surgical removal of all or part of the urinary bladder. The vas deferens is a partially coiled tube which exits the abdominal cavity through the inguinal canal. 6e1e40a19d Evaluation of the tissue removed during cystectomy and lymph node dissection aids in determining pathological cancer staging. Two main types of cystectomies can be performed. A partial cystectomy (also known as a segmental cystectomy) involves removal of only a portion of the bladder. Umbrella cell Umbrella cells Umbrella cells (also known as facet cells, capping cells, and superficial urotheliocytes) are a type of cells located in the bladder, the renal pelvis, the ureters, and the urethra. Umbrella cells are linked together with tight junctions which:. Umbrella cells are special in that they can contain multiple nuclei. Umbrella cells form the outermost layer of the urothelium of these organs.
