Magnesium Like the other alkaline earth metals (group 2 of the periodic table), it occurs naturally only in combination with other elements and almost always has an oxidation state of +2. It is a shiny gray metal having a low density, low melting point, and high chemical reactivity. The metal is obtained mainly by electrolysis of magnesium salts obtained from brine.
