== Signs and symptoms == 031383679e CNS involvement is observed in 5% of acute leukaemia patients. It is regarded as an indicator of poor prognosis, and increased difficulty in treatment due to the drug-expelling properties of the blood-brain barrier (BBB). Preventative treatment may be recommended for more aggressive lymphomas and leukaemias, including non-Hodgkin lymphoma, of which Diffuse Large B-cell lymphoma (DLBCL) is the most common subtype. 031383679e The causes of diffuse large B-cell lymphoma are not well understood. Usually DLBCL arises from normal B cells, but it can also represent a malignant transformation of other types of lymphoma (particularly marginal zone lymphomas) or, in rare cases termed Richter's transformation, chronic lymphocytic leukemia. Intraocular lymphoma PIOL and PCNSL remain enigmas because both structures are immunologically privileged sites (the brain sits behind the blood-brain barrier and the retina sits behind the blood-retinal barrier) and so do not normally have immune cells trafficking through these structures. PIOL is a subset of primary central nervous system lymphoma (PCNSL). Most cases of PIOL eventuate to central nervous system involvement (PCNSL) while only 20% of PCNSL lead to intraocular (PIOL) involvement. Primary tumors can affect either the peripheral nervous system (PNS) or the central nervous system (CNS). They may be either benign or malignant. A secondary tumor may be found in the CNS that has spread from another part of the body. 031383679e Prognosis and treatment depends on the specific type of lymphoma as well as the stage and grade. Treatment includes radiation and chemotherapy. Early-stage indolent B-cell lymphomas can often be treated with radiation alone, with long-term non-recurrence. Early-stage aggressive disease is treated with chemotherapy and often radiation, with a 70–90% cure rate. Late-stage indolent lymphomas are sometimes left untreated and monitored until they progress. Late-stage aggressive disease is treated... 031383679e Treatment and prognosis depend on factors such as the type of tumor, location, and molecular characteristics. 031383679e PCNSLs represent around 20% of all cases of lymphomas in HIV infections. (Other types are Burkitt's lymphomas and immunoblastic lymphomas). Primary CNS lymphoma is highly associated with Epstein-Barr virus (EBV) infection (> 90%) in immunodeficient patients (such as those with AIDS and those immunosuppressed), and does not have a predilection for any particular age group. Mean CD4+ count at time of diagnosis is $\sim 50/\mu\text{L}$. In immunocompromised patients, prognosis is usually poor. In immunocompetent patients (that is, patients who do not have AIDS or some other acquired or secondary immunodeficiency), there is rarely an association with EBV infection or other DNA viruses. In the immunocompetent population, PCNSLs typically appear in older patients in their 50s and 60s. 031383679e

Lymphoma Signs and symptoms may include enlarged lymph nodes, fever, drenching sweats, unintended weight loss, itching, and constantly feeling tired. The name typically refers to just the cancerous versions rather than all such tumors. The enlarged lymph nodes are usually painless. The sweats are most common at night. == Types == 031383679e Risk factors for Hodgkin lymphoma include infection with Epstein-Barr virus and a history of the disease in the family. Risk factors for common types of non-Hodgkin lymphomas include autoimmune diseases, HIV/AIDS, infection with human T-lymphotropic virus, immunosuppressant medications, and some pesticides. Eating large amounts of red meat and tobacco smoking may also increase the risk. Diagnosis, if enlarged lymph nodes are present, is usually by lymph node biopsy. Blood, urine, and bone marrow testing may also be useful in the diagnosis... 031383679e The most widely-used prophylactic drug is methotrexate (MTX), which is normally administered by one of two methods: intravenous injection (IV HD-MTX) and intrathecal injection (IT-MTX). Intravenous injection requires a direct

injection of high-dose MTX into a patient's vein; Intrathecal injection, i.e. injection of the drug into the intrathecal space holding cerebrospinal fluid (CSF... 031383679e B-cell lymphomas include both Hodgkin's lymphomas and most non-Hodgkin lymphomas. They are typically divided into low and high grade, typically corresponding to indolent (slow-growing) lymphomas and aggressive lymphomas, respectively. As a generalisation, indolent lymphomas respond to treatment and are kept under control (in remission) with long-term survival of many years, but are not cured. Aggressive lymphomas usually require intensive treatments, with some having a good prospect for a permanent cure. 031383679e The histologic classification of the lymphoma, as well as the locations and severity of the disease, all influence the clinical presentation of HIV-related lymphomas. HIV-related lymphomas are more likely to present with advanced stage disease, constitutional symptoms (also known as "B" symptoms; fever, weight loss, and night sweats), extranodal involvement, or disease involving unusual locations (such as the body cavity or soft tissue) than lymphomas in the HIV-negative population. 031383679e

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
