With some lung diseases, a recipient may only need to receive a single lung. With other lung diseases such as cystic fibrosis, it is imperative that a recipient receive two lungs. While lung transplants carry certain associated risks, they can also extend life expectancy and enhance the quality of life for those with end stage pulmonary disease. Donor lungs can be retrieved from a living or deceased donor

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The first successful partial face transplant on a living human was performed on Isabelle Dinoire in November 2005 at the Amiens-Picardie University Hospital in France. The 15-hour surgical operation transplanted a triangular graft comprising the nose, lips, and chin from a deceased donor onto Dinoire, who had suffered a traumatic facial injury earlier that year. The first full face transplant was completed in Spain in March 2010 by a team at Vall d'Hebron University Hospital in Barcelona, Spain, onto a male recipient... 1e9b76e001 == History == 1e9b76e001 The kidney participates in the control of the volume of various body fluids, fluid osmolality, acid-base balance, various electrolyte concentrations, and removal of toxins. Filtration occurs in the glomerulus: one-fifth of the blood volume that enters the kidneys is filtered. Examples of substances reabsorbed are solute-free water, sodium, bicarbonate, glucose, and amino acids. Examples of substances secreted are hydrogen, ammonium, potassium and uric acid. The nephron is the structural and functional unit of the kidney. Each adult human kidney contains around 1 million nephrons, while a mouse kidney contains only about 12,500 nephrons. Heart transplantation The patient's own heart is either removed and replaced with the donor heart (orthotopic procedure) or, much less commonly,

the recipient's diseased heart is left in place to support the donor heart (heterotopic, or "piggyback", transplant procedure). As of 2018, the most common procedure is to take a functioning heart from a recently deceased organ donor (brain death is the most common) and implant it into the patient. 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Commercial trade in human organs is currently illegal in all countries except Iran. Recent bans on the commercial organ trade (e.g. India in 1994 and the Philippines in 2008) have increased the availability of transplants and the safety of the procedures. Despite these prohibitions, organ trafficking and transplant tourism remain widespread (however, the data on the extent of the black market trade in organs is difficult to obtain). The question of whether to legalize and regulate the organ trade to combat illegal trafficking and the significant global organ shortage is greatly debated. This discussion typically centers on the sale of kidneys by living donors, since human beings are born with two kidneys but need only one

Tissues include bones, tendons (both referred to as musculoskeletal grafts), corneae, skin, heart valves, nerves and veins. Face transplant Facial transplantation may include the grafting of skin, lips, facial musculature, sensory nerves, and, potentially, underlying facial bones such as those of the nose. Recipients of face transplants require lifelong immunosuppressive therapy to prevent rejection of the transplanted

tissue by the immune system. It is a form of Vascularized Composite Tissue Allotransplantation (VCA), a surgical technique involving the transplantation of multiple types of tissues as a functional unit. More than one-third of potential living kidney donors who want to donate their kidney to a friend or family member cannot because of blood type or antibody incompatibility. Historically, these donors would be turned away and the patient would lose the opportunity to receive a life-saving kidney transplant. 1e9b76e001 Lung transplantation is the therapeutic measure of last resort for patients with end-stage lung disease who have exhausted all other available treatments without improvement. A variety of conditions may make such surgery necessary. The most common indications for a lung transplant are pulmonary fibrosis, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), cystic fibrosis, and pulmonary vascular disease including pulmonary hypertension or pulmonary arterial hypertension. 1e9b76e001

Kidney transplantation Kidney transplant is typically Kidney transplant or renal transplant is the organ transplant of a kidney into a patient with end-stage kidney disease (ESRD). The first successful kidney transplant was performed in 1954 by a team including Joseph Murray, the recipient's surgeon, and Hartwell Harrison, surgeon for the donor. Murray was awarded a Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine in 1990 for this and other work. Kidney transplant or renal transplant is the organ transplant of a kidney into a patient with end-stage kidney disease (ESRD). Living-donor kidney transplants are further characterized as genetically related (living-related) or non-related (living-unrelated) transplants, depending on whether a biological relationship

exists between the donor and recipient. Kidney transplant is typically classified as deceased-donor (formerly known as cadaveric) or living-donor transplantation depending on the source of the donor organ. In 2018, an estimated 95,479 kidney transplants were performed worldwide, 36% of which came from living donors 1e9b76e001

Before receiving a kidney transplant, a person with ESRD must undergo a thorough medical evaluation to make sure that they are healthy enough to undergo transplant surgery. If they are deemed a good candidate, they can be placed on a waiting list to receive a kidney from a deceased donor. Approximately 5,000 heart transplants are performed each year worldwide, more than half of which are in the US. Post-operative survival periods average 15 years. Heart transplantation is not considered to be a cure for heart disease; rather it is a life-saving treatment intended to improve the quality and duration of life for a recipient. 1e9b76e001

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
