The bodies of elephants have a relatively high fat content, with one prominent fatty area being the foot pads of the feet. The long bones of elephants lack significant marrow cavities. Elephant flesh has been described as appetising in historical accounts (though reportedly tough when cooked over a fire), with the meat of juveniles being reportedly considered tastier than that of adults by some African hunter gatherer groups. Over five billion species are estimated to have died out. It is estimated that there are currently around 8.7 million species of eukaryotes globally, possibly many times more if prokaryotes are included. Notable extinct animal species include non-avian dinosaurs, saber-toothed cats, and mammoths. Through evolution, species arise through the process of speciation. Species become extinct when they are no longer able to survive in changing conditions or against superior competition. The relationship between animals and their ecological niches has been firmly established. The range of the woolly rhinoceros contracted towards Siberia beginning around 17,000 years ago, with the youngest reliable records being around 14,000 years old in northeast Siberia, coinciding with the Bølling-Allerød warming, which likely disrupted its habitat, with environmental DNA records possibly extending. Mummified carcasses preserved in permafrost and many bone remains of woolly rhinoceroses have been found. It had a massive hump reaching from its shoulder and fed mainly by grazing on herbaceous plants that grew in the steppe. The woolly rhinoceros was large, comparable in size to the largest living rhinoceros species, the white rhinoceros (*Ceratotherium simum*), and covered with long, thick hair that allowed it to survive in the extremely cold, harsh mammoth steppe. Like other Pleistocene megafauna, the species became extinct as part of the end-Pleistocene extinction event. Images of woolly rhinoceroses are found among cave paintings in Europe and Asia, and evidence has been found suggesting that the species was hunted by humans c5eba84e16

Late Pleistocene extinctions Human impact on megafauna populations is thought to have been driven by hunting ("overkill"), as well as possibly environmental alteration. The timing and severity of the extinctions varied by region and are generally thought to have been driven by the globally expanding population of modern humans, climatic change, or a combination of both. The relative importance of human versus climatic factors in the extinctions has been the subject of long-running controversy, though most scholars support at least a contributory role of humans in the extinctions. The extinctions during the Late Pleistocene are differentiated from previous extinctions by their extreme size bias towards large animals (with small animals being largely unaffected), the widespread absence of ecological succession to replace these extinct megafaunal species, and the regime shift of previously established faunal relationships and habitats as a consequence. instance, ground sloths survived on the Antilles long after North and South American ground sloths were extinct, woolly mammoths died out on remote Wrangel Island The Late Pleistocene to the beginning of the Holocene saw the extinction of the majority of the world's megafauna,

typically defined as animal species having body masses of 45 kg (99 lb) or more, which resulted in a collapse in faunal density and diversity across the globe c5eba84e16

De-extinction Similar techniques have been applied to certain endangered species, in hopes of boosting their genetic diversity. The only method of the three that would provide an animal with the same genetic identity is cloning. There are benefits and drawbacks to the process of de-extinction ranging from technological advancements to ethical issues. Cloning is the most widely proposed method, although genome editing and selective breeding have also been considered. There are several ways to carry out the process of de-extinction. effects of bringing back the extinct woolly mammoth would have on the environment, such as the potential for reversing some of the damage caused by global De-extinction (also known as resurrection biology, or species revivalism) is the process of human intervention to generate an organism that either resembles or is an extinct organism c5eba84e16

The artificial cloning of organisms, sometimes known as reproductive cloning, is often accomplished via somatic-cell nuclear transfer (SCNT), a cloning method in which a viable embryo is created from a somatic cell and an egg cell. In 1996, Dolly the sheep achieved notoriety for being the first mammal cloned from an adult somatic cell.
