Hospital-acquired infection device-associated infections include ventilator-associated pneumonia, catheter-associated blood stream infections, catheter-associated urinary tract infections and A hospital-acquired infection (HAI), also known as a nosocomial infection (from Greek nosokomeîon "hospital, infirmary," from nósos "disease" + koméō "to tend, care for," with locative suffix -eîon), is an infection that is acquired in a hospital or other healthcare facility. The term nosocomial infection is used when there is a lack of evidence that the infection was present when the patient entered the healthcare setting, thus meaning it was acquired or became problematic post-admission. Such an infection can be acquired in a hospital, nursing home, rehabilitation facility, outpatient clinic, diagnostic laboratory or other clinical settings. To encompass both hospital and non-hospital settings, it is sometimes instead called a healthcare-associated infection c32460eff5

Pseudomonas aeruginosa is an opportunistic human pathogen most commonly infecting immunocompromised patients, such as those with cancer, diabetes, cystic fibrosis, severe burns, AIDS, or people who are very young or elderly. Infection can affect many parts of the body, but infections typically target the respiratory tract, the renal system, and the gastrointestinal system or it can cause blood infection. Symptoms may include bacterial pneumonia, severe coughing, congestion, urinary tract infection (UTI), pain in the ears and eyes, joint pain, neck or back pain, headache, diarrhea, a rash which can include pimples filled with pus, and/or swelling in the eyes. Complications include pneumonia, gangrene, necrotizing fasciitis, compartment syndrome, necrosis, loss of an extremity, and sepsis, which may lead to septic shock and death. In a surveillance study between 1986 and 1989, *P. aeruginosa* was the third leading

Urinary incontinence is common in older women and has been identified as an important issue in geriatric health care. UI is an example of a stigmatized medical condition, which creates barriers to successful management and makes the problem worse. The term enuresis is often used to refer to urinary incontinence primarily in children, such as nocturnal enuresis (bed wetting). Diabetes also can have a direct effect on urination due to peripheral neuropathies, which occur in some individuals with poorly controlled diabetics. c32460eff5 Esterase enzymes have the activity of hydrolyzing ester bonds in various substrates. In an electrochemical study using an ester substrate called 4-((tosyl-l-alanyl)oxy)phenyl tosyl-l-alaninate (TAPTA), direct esterolytic activity of leukocyte esterase could be demonstrated. Leukocyte esterase was found to hydrolyze TAPTA, releasing a redox-active fragment that provided a numerical measure of leukocyte esterase activity when oxidized at an electrode. c32460eff5 A number of dynamic processes can bring contamination into operating rooms and other areas within nosocomial settings. The most common infection is that of the uterus and surrounding tissues known as puerperal sepsis, postpartum metritis, or postpartum endometritis. Medications that can cause problems include anticholinergics, antihistamines, tricyclic antidepressants, cyclobenzaprine, diazepam, nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAID), stimulants, and opioids.

Leukocyte esterase American Leukocyte esterase is a type of esterase enzyme released by white blood cells (leukocytes), particularly neutrophils, when they are activated or recruited to a site of infection or inflammation. Although the exact structure and biological function remains unclear, leukocyte esterase represents a type of biomarker for leukocytes and thus can be utilized as a screening or diagnostic tool for various clinical pathologies c32460eff5
