Glycogen storage disease type IV GSD IV is autosomal recessive, which means each parent has one mutant copy of the gene but shows no symptoms of the disease and males and females are equally likely to be affected. Therefore, glycogen is not made properly, and abnormal glycogen molecules, called polyglucosan, accumulate in cells. GSD IV affects 1 in 236,000 individuals worldwide, with 3% of all GSDs being type IV. Classic Andersen Disease typically becomes apparent during the first few months after the patient is born, while other variants of GSD IV may develop in late childhood or adulthood. It is the result of a mutation in the GBE1 gene, which causes a defect in the glycogen branching enzyme. Andersen. Approximately 1 in 20,000 to 25,000 newborns have a glycogen storage disease. The GBE1 mutations can result in early-onset GSD IV (also called Andersen Disease) or adult-onset GSD IV (also called Adult Polyglucosan Body Disease). Diagnosis may be difficult and often involves a combination of blood tests, urine tests, and a liver biopsy. Genetic testing may be used to screen family members of those affected. 577f169962 The body of liver flukes is leaf-like and flattened. The body is covered with a tegument. They are hermaphrodites having complete sets of both male and female reproductive systems. They have simple digestive systems and primarily feed on blood. The anterior end has the oral sucker opening into the mouth. Inside, the mouth leads to a small pharynx which is followed by an extended intestine that runs the entire length of the body. The intestine is heavily branched and the anus is absent. Instead, the intestine runs along an excretory canal that opens at the posterior end. Adult flukes produce eggs that are passed out through the excretory pore. Feline diabetes mellitus is a chronic disease in cats whereby either insufficient insulin response or insulin resistance leads to persistently high blood Feline diabetes mellitus is a chronic disease in cats whereby either insufficient insulin response or insulin resistance leads to persistently high blood glucose concentrations. In cats with type 2 diabetes, prompt effective treatment may lead to diabetic remission, in which the cat no longer needs injected insulin. Diabetes is less common in cats than in dogs. The condition is treatable, and if treated properly the cat can experience a normal life expectancy 577f169962
