War. The WUO took part in such actions as the jailbreak of Timothy Leary in 1970. The "Days of Rage", the WUO's first riot in October 1969 in Chicago, was timed to coincide with the trial of the Chicago Seven. In 1970 the group issued a "Declaration of a State of War" against the U.S. government under the name "Weather Underground Organization".
