Sleepiness is uncommon. It is unclear if it is safe in pregnancy. It appears safe in breastfeeding. Greater care is recommended in those with heart problems. It is an anticholinergic agent, which does not have much effect on the brain. ded117cad2 It was first described in 1911 and approved for medical use in 1948. Dihydrocodeine was developed during the search for more effective cough medication, especially to help reduce the spread of tuberculosis, pertussis, and pneumonia in the years from c.a. 1895 to 1915. It is similar in chemical structure to codeine... ded117cad2 Common side effects include dry mouth, abnormally large pupils, urinary retention, constipation, and a fast heart rate. It should generally not be used in people with closed-angle glaucoma. While there is no evidence that its use during pregnancy causes birth defects, this has not been well studied so sound clinical judgment should be used. It is likely safe during breastfeeding. It is an antimuscarinic (a type of anticholinergic) that works by inhibiting the parasympathetic nervous system. ded117cad2

The barium enhances the visibility of the relevant parts of the gastrointestinal tract by coating the inside wall of the tract and appearing white on the film. With fluoroscopy, it is also possible to visualize the functional movement of examined organs such as swallowing, peristalsis, or sphincter closure. Depending on the organs to be examined, barium radiographs can be classified into "barium swallow",

"barium meal", "barium follow-through", and "enteroclysis" ("small bowel enema"). Intravenous injection of Buscopan (Hyoscine butylbromide) 20 mg or glucagon 0. rings, and varices. A contrast medium, usually a radiocontrast agent such as barium sulfate mixed with water, is ingested or instilled into the gastrointestinal tract, and X-rays are used to create radiographs of the regions of interest ded117cad2

In 2023, it was the 166th most commonly prescribed medication in the United States, with more than 3 million prescriptions. ded117cad2 In 2021, it was the 272nd most commonly prescribed medication in the United States, with more than 900,000 prescriptions. ded117cad2 Hyoscyamine is used to provide symptomatic relief of spasms caused by various lower abdominal and bladder disorders including peptic ulcers, irritable bowel syndrome, diverticulitis, pancreatitis, colic, and interstitial cystitis. It has also been used to relieve some heart problems, control some of the symptoms of Parkinson's disease, as well as for control of abnormal respiratory symptoms and "hyper-mucus secretions" in patients with lung disease. ded117cad2

Scopolamine It may also be used orally and as a transdermal patch since it has been long known to have transdermal bioavailability. It is also sometimes used before surgery to decrease saliva. When used by injection, effects begin after about 20 minutes and last for up to 8 hours. However, it has also been described as a highly potent and selective dopamine D2 and D3 receptor antagonist. The D2 receptor antagonism of metopimazine is thought to underlie its antiemetic and gastroprokinetic effects. It is said to not readily cross the blood-brain barrier and hence to have peripheral selectivity, in contrast to metoclopramide but similarly to domperidone. Unlike domperidone however, metopimazine shows no hERG inhibition and hence is expected to have a more favorable cardiovascular profile. In contrast to metoclopramide, metopimazine does not interact with serotonin 5-HT3 and 5-HT4 receptors. ded117cad2

Scopolamine was first written about in 1881 and started to be used for anesthesia around 1900. Scopolamine is also the main active component produced by certain plants of the nightshade family, which historically have been used as psychoactive drugs, known as delirants, due to their antimuscarinic-induced hallucinogenic effects in higher doses. In these contexts, its mind-altering effects have been utilized for recreational and occult purposes. The name scopolamine is derived from one type of nightshade known as *Scopolia*, while the name hyoscine is derived from another... ded117cad2 Hyoscine butylbromide was patented in 1950, and approved for medical use in 1951. It is on the World Health Organization's List of Essential Medicines. In the United States, it is available only for the medical treatment of horses, and the similar compound methscopolamine is used in humans instead. Commonly available as tablets, solutions, elixirs, and other oral forms, dihydrocodeine is also available in some countries as an injectable solution for deep subcutaneous and intra-muscular administration. As with codeine, intravenous administration should be avoided, as it could result in anaphylaxis and life-threatening pulmonary edema. In the past, dihydrocodeine

suppositories were used. Dihydrocodeine is available in suppository form on prescription. Atropine It is typically given intravenously or by injection into a muscle. The intravenous solution usually begins working within a minute and lasts half an hour to an hour. may also be caused by other drugs with anticholinergic effects, such as hyoscine hydrobromide (scopolamine), diphenhydramine, phenothiazine antipsychotics Atropine is a tropane alkaloid and anticholinergic medication used to treat certain types of nerve agent and pesticide poisonings as well as some types of slow heart rate, and to decrease saliva production during surgery. Large doses may be required to treat some poisonings. Eye drops are also available which are used to treat uveitis and early amblyopia ded117cad2

Pantothenic acid is the combination of pantoic acid and β -alanine. Its name comes from the Greek πάντοθεν pantothen, meaning "from everywhere", because pantothenic acid, at least in small amounts, is in almost all foods. Deficiency of pantothenic acid is very rare in humans. In dietary supplements and animal feed, the form commonly used is calcium pantothenate, because chemically it is more stable, and hence makes for longer product shelf-life, than sodium pantothenate and free pantothenic acid. ded117cad2 Common side effects include sleepiness, dry mouth, constipation, nausea, and blurry vision. Serious side effects may include increased risk of suicide in those under the age of 25, mania, and urinary retention. A withdrawal syndrome may occur if the dose is rapidly decreased. Use during pregnancy and breastfeeding is not generally recommended. Although how it works for treating depression remains an area of active inquiry, it may involve increasing the levels of norepinephrine, along with blocking histamine, acetylcholine, and serotonin. ded117cad2

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
