It includes the significant medical, social, psychological, demographic and economic consequences of the medical, non-medical, and recreational abuse of these medications 3c37f4b4f4

In the United States, there were approximately 109,600 drug-overdose-related deaths in the 12-month period ending January 31, 2023, at a rate of 300 deaths per day. 3c37f4b4f4

Opioid epidemic in the United States The third wave, starting in 2013, was marked by a steep tenfold increase in the synthetic opioid-involved death rate as synthetic opioids flooded the US market. original on July 9, 2021. The opioid epidemic unfolded in three waves. It has been described by doctors and researchers as "one of the most devastating public health catastrophes of our time". The second wave was from an expansion in the heroin market to supply already addicted people. The first wave of the epidemic in the United States began in the late 1990s, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), when opioids were increasingly prescribed for pain management, resulting in a rise in overall opioid use throughout subsequent years. Nevertheless, harm reduction advocates claim that the user can be responsible by employing the same general principles applicable to the use of alcohol: avoiding hazardous situations, excessive doses, and hazardous combinations of drugs; avoiding injection; and not using drugs at the same time as activities that may be unsafe without a sober state. Drug use can be thought of as an activity that is potentially beneficial but also potentially risky. Similar to other risky activities such as skydiving or mountain climbing, the varied risks of drug use can be minimized by using harm-reduction strategies such as education, caution, and common sense. Estonia has the highest rate of 3-methylfentanyl overdose Fentanyl is a highly potent synthetic opioid of the piperidine family, used primarily as pain medication. Fentanyl is also used as a sedative for intubated patients. Many fentanyl overdoses are initially classified as heroin overdoses. Its primary clinical use is in pain management for cancer patients and those recovering from surgery. It is 50 to 100 times more potent than morphine. can lead to overdose. Brand names include Actiq, Duragesic, and Sublimaze, among others.

Naloxone done on women with opioid use disorder who were taking Suboxone, no studies have been done to see if treatment with naloxone for an opioid overdose can increase Naloxone, sold under the brand name Narcan among others, is an opioid antagonist, a medication used to reverse or reduce the effects of opioids. Naloxone blocks the effects of opioids for 30 to 90 minutes. Effects begin within two minutes when given intravenously, five minutes when injected into a muscle, and ten minutes as a nasal spray. Naloxone is commonly used to restore breathing after an opioid overdose. Naloxone has also been said to have an onset of action of 3–7 minutes as an intranasal 3c37f4b4f4

Opioids are a diverse class of moderate to strong painkillers, including oxycodone (commonly sold under the trade names OxyContin and Percocet), hydrocodone (Vicodin, Norco), and fentanyl (Abstral, Actiq, Duragesic, Fentora), which is a very strong painkiller that is synthesized to resemble other opiates such as opium-derived morphine and heroin. The potency and availability of these substances, despite the potential risk of addiction and overdose, have made them popular both as medical treatments and as recreational drugs. Due to the sedative effects of opioids on the respiratory center of the medulla oblongata, opioids in high doses present the potential for respiratory depression and may cause respiratory failure and death. 3c37f4b4f4 Opioids include substances such as heroin, morphine, fentanyl, codeine, dihydrocodeine, oxycodone, hydrocodone, and tramadol. A useful standard for the relative strength of different opioids is morphine milligram equivalents (MME). The term lean refers to the tendency for users to have difficulty standing up straight and walking while under the influence of the drug. Harm reduction agonist buprenorphine or a combination of buprenorphine/naloxone (brand name Suboxone). Harm reduction initiatives recognize that people can make positive changes to protect themselves and others, without requiring abstinence. Harm reduction is used to encourage healthy behaviors that can decrease the negative consequences for those facing life challenges like homelessness and food insecurity, or engaging in harm-prone behaviors such as recreational drug use and sexual activity. Oral/sublingual formulations of buprenorphine incorporate the opioid Harm reduction, or harm minimization, refers to a range of intentional practices and public health policies designed to lessen the negative social and/or physical consequences associated with various human behaviors, both legal and illegal 3c37f4b4f4

Administration to opioid-dependent individuals may cause symptoms of opioid withdrawal, including restlessness, agitation, nausea, vomiting, a fast heart rate, and sweating. To prevent this, small doses every few minutes can be given until the desired effect is reached. In those with previous heart disease or taking medications that negatively affect the heart, further heart problems have occurred. There is limited data on naloxone's safety during pregnancy. Naloxone is a non-selective and competitive opioid receptor antagonist. It reverses the depression of the central nervous system and respiratory system caused by opioids. 3c37f4b4f4 Fentanyl was first synthesized by Paul Janssen in 1960 and was approved for medical use in the United States in 1968. In 2015, 1,600

kilograms (3,500 pounds) were used in healthcare globally. As of 2017, fentanyl was the most widely used synthetic opioid in medicine; in 2019, it was the 278th most commonly prescribed medication in the United States, with more than a million prescriptions. It is on the World Health Organization's List of Essential Medicines. Harm reduction is most commonly applied to approaches that reduce adverse consequences from drug use, and harm reduction programs now operate across a range of services and in different regions of the world. As of 2020, some 86 countries had one or more programs using a harm reduction approach to substance use, primarily aimed at reducing blood-borne infections resulting from use of contaminated injecting equipment. Risk factors include a history of opioid misuse, current opioid misuse, young age, socioeconomic status, race, untreated psychiatric disorders, and environments that promote misuse (social, family, professional, etc.). Complications may include opioid overdose, suicide, HIV/AIDS, hepatitis C, and problems meeting social or professional responsibilities. Diagnosis may be based on criteria by the American Psychiatric Association in the DSM-5.

Heroin Medical-grade diamorphine is used as a pure hydrochloride salt. Black tar heroin is a variable admixture of morphine derivatives—predominantly 6-MAM (6-monoacetylmorphine), which is the result of crude acetylation during clandestine production of street heroin. Various white and brown powders sold illegally around the world as heroin are routinely diluted with cutting agents. behavioral therapy and medications. A heroin overdose may be treated with naloxone. Heroin is used medically in several countries to relieve pain, such as during childbirth or a heart attack. As of 2015 Heroin, also known as diacetylmorphine and diamorphine among other names, is a morphinan opioid substance synthesized from the dried latex of the opium poppy; it is mainly used as a recreational drug for its euphoric effects. Medications can include buprenorphine, methadone, or naltrexone
